# Wall of Honor To Be Established -

Housatonic has a long impressive list of graduates. There are those who have succeeded in the business world or made their mark in humanitarian pursuits. Still others have quietly lived their lives raising families and contributing to their communities. From this small rural high school, they have gone off to all corners of the world. The Alumni Association has decided that it is only fitting to recognize the accomplishments of our graduates.

Working along with Housatonic Vice Principal Ian Strever, members devised the guidelines and application form to allow for the consideration of candidates.

The wall shall support the core values of Housatonic by recognizing the individuals who exemplify them in their life's work: "The HVRHS community promotes personal and academic growth as well as independence of thought and spirit for all its members, within a culture of respect, responsibility and safety. The core values that support this statement include a

commitment to 21<sup>st</sup> century academic expectations which encourage all members to grow to their potential, accept and respect different learning styles, solve problems and think analytically, and communicate their ideas effectively. Members of the school community are also expected to make ethical choices, demonstrate social and civic responsibility, and show pride and care for the school and its environment."

A diverse committee made up of association members as well as staff and students from the school will convene every other year to vote on approving membership. The induction will alternate with the Athletic Hall of Fame. Rules call for:

- Having attended Housatonic for at least two years
- · Having graduated from Housatonic
- Having been an alumnus for at least 10 years

- Having made significant contributions in their chosen fields, in volunteer service or to Regional School District #1
- Having modeled high standards of excellence in personal and/or professional life.

Up to 10 candidates will be inducted. Posthumous nominations will accepted. The Wall of Honor display case will be located in the front hallway and consist of a series of plaques listing recipients' names and their year of graduation. An additional video display will feature a multimedia presentation elaborating the accomplishments of the inductees. A membership plaque will be given to each inductee. Selected candidates will be notified and a ceremony will be held in the fall.

Members of the Alumni Association were recently faced with a mystery, albeit a very nice one. The organization received a most generous bequest from a graduate named Paige Mallory, but a search of yearbooks found no such person. Not to be daunted, some in the group became sleuths and Bunny McGuire, class of '55, solved the case. We had a clue that Elsie Jenkins may have known Paige Mallory, so Bunny contacted her. It turns out that Elsie's mother and Paige were first cousins. Elsie wrote that Paige's given name was Caroline Camp Moore. She took the last name of her stepfather. Raised in Canaan, she left for New York City after graduation and changed her name to Paige Mallory.

Association President Patricia Allyn Mechare, class of '64, was able to track down Paige's friend Mary Johnson, who filled in more of the blanks. When Paige first came to New York, she enrolled in advanced dance classes and eventually became a member of the

celebrated June Taylor Dancers, performing all over the country. Realizing she'd always be a member of the chorus, she took courses at New York University, got a business degree and enrolled at Katherine Gibbs. Mary met her in New York when Paige was working for publisher and media mogul Rupert Murdoch. Previously she'd worked for the Racing News and The Star in managerial positions. Her last job was at News America where she was a personal assistant for Mrs. Murdoch. She later retired to Florida, where she died in April 2016.

Of her friend, Mary wrote, "There was only one Paige Mallory. This was a great lady who was full of charm and joy. She was smart and sassy and wise beyond belief. She would listen to a problem, mull it over in conversation and solve it in such a way that it would always make the questioners believe they came up with the resolution. She was a tough, self-confident boss—a hard task master, but a compassionate, caring and loyal friend."

Her name is scattered about as a member of several organizations, including the Debating Club, features editor of the Northwest Corner, the Commercial Club and the Glee Club. She was named "the most sophisticated girl" under class superlatives and dubbed "A half-pint of sophistication" beneath her class photo. Mary said Paige often spoke nostalgically of her years in Litchfield County and "credited her high school teachers for instilling her self-confidence to follow her dream." Perhaps that explains why after all these years, she still remembered the influence Housatonic played in her life and chose to honor it with this gift for which we are most grateful.



### A NEW LOOK

Mountaineers of a certain era remember Housatonic in its earlier spiffier condition. As the years have gone by, some of the facilities have taken on a tired look and need attention. A large renovation project is about to begin this summer. Voters in the six towns approved the \$5.7 million expenditure at a referendum last year. Top on the list is an upgrade to the science classrooms, which unfortunately have not been touched since the 1960s. The sports locker rooms will also get a facelift, with a designated space for visiting teams and an elevator to make the lockers handicapped accessible. Reroofing sections of the building is also in the plan.

respect for the tectonic plates and the minerals of our world. I loved the Wednesdays when the ladies in the kitchen would serve up spaghetti, meatballs and salad, a favorite of my family now.

The challenges we learned about continue to this day. I remember working to change the rules; back then girls could not wear pants!! Seems almost unimaginable given the current attire of students. I shudder today realizing that women are still fighting for equal pay and reproductive rights.

I will never forget Jack Mahoney, one of my favorite teachers. He would never allow students to be mediocre if he knew they could do better. He had no problem letting them know! It was Mr. Mahoney who started a Black Literature group. And, it was through this that we really came to understand civil rights, learn black history and appreciate how far we had to go to make our society equal for all citizens.

I remember our senior class picnic at Kent Falls and really wrecking my parents' car as Dona Olsen, Faye Stahovec and I didn't pay attention backing up and tore the car door off! There were sunny days on the back of a motorcycle, the junior prom, the senior ball, a wondrous mix of learning, fun and growing up before the responsibilities of adulthood were fully ours.

One of my favorite memories is rolling the Earth Ball across the front green on the very first Earth Day in 1970. It was a bright warm day and we were ready to go fight against pollution and those things that would harm Mother Earth. That day was first celebrated in 1970, and is now coordinated globally by the Earth Day Network and celebrated in more than 193 countries each year.

It is amazing that many of the causes and concerns that I learned about at Housatonic almost 47 years ago still need to be fought for and require continued active support. Donna went on to have a distinguished career in nursing and retired as the director of Hospice at the Salisbury Visiting Nurse Association.
