


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

Class of 1966 honors memory

Our class — the Class of 1966 — is the last to spend all four years at the Housatonic Valley Regional High School under the principalship of Dr. Paul W. Stoddard. Head of the school since its inception twenty-seven years ago, he planned to retire July 31. He died July 2.

We count it an important privilege to have attended a school that Dr. Stoddard, more than anyone else, had developed from the first regional high school east of the Hudson River into an institution of wide renown. He attracted many distinguished personalities and countless observers to visit our school. He also went out to share with educators and citizens throughout New England the benefits of our pioneer experience.

Even more important to us, however, was the dayto-day relationship we enjoyed with this busy man who always found time for us. For twenty-one years he taught a unique lecture course in Contemporary Problems to all seniors. His office was always open to us, and he interviewed most of the seniors at least once during the school year. Whenever we called the school during off-hours, the chances were that he would answer the telephone. A favorie pastime of passers-by on Route 7 was to bet whether or not Dr. Stoddard would be at the school. More often than not he was, with lights burning in the main office and his car parked outside, whether it was a Sunday afternoon, a holiday weekend, 4 P.M. or 2 A.M. of a school day.






Dr. Stoddard's devotion to the school, its students, and the residents of this area became legendary. At the same time, he brought to our little corner of Connecticut the experience and the wisdom of a true citizen of the world. He flew around the world one Easter weekend. He knew both Oxford University and the University of Moscow. He stood in line on a tragic day in November to pay tribute to a gallant young president. He rarely missed a Yale commencement or home football game. An inveterate theater-goer, he filled a closet with the programs for most of the important productions of our time. His scholarly interests included literature, alcoholism, psychology, politics, sociology, movies, and cats. As a

Dr. Stoddard's retirement and untimely death marked the end of an era in the history of the school. We join the citizens of the Regional District in honoring him for all he did for us. He never forgot us. We shall not forget him.

basketball team wins second place





Norm Stoddard, the junior starter, improve tremendously toward the end of the season. Be ing the only underclass starter, he was elected a next year's captain.







The 1966 baseball team emerged with eleven wins and seven losses in a hard fought season during which twelve games were decided by three runs or less.

The season opened with a twelve-inning win over Lewis Mills Regional. Euge Delaini drove in the winning run and Don Atkins pitched the entire game. Following a win over Terryville, the team went into a slump, losing three games in a row. The streak was broken by the highlight of the season, a perfect game pitched by Don Atkins, defeating James Memorial 4-0.

With the Canton game the Mountaineers put together a five-game winning streak, defeating also Avon, Mills, Terryville and Berlin. The Berlin game marked the 150th career win for Coach Ed Kirby as varsity coach. The team finished strong, winning eight out of the last ten games including the season's finale over Canton 11-0. In this game Captain Blanchet, Delaini, Ullram, Togninalli, Atkins, Meuten, and Thompson played their last contest for the Housatonic nine. The baseball team failed to qualify for the State Tournament for the first time since 1955, missing by one game. A bright future is forecast by the junior varsity record of 13 wins and 3 losses under the capable direction of Coach John Mahoney.

The team was led in hitting by Don Atkins with .432, followed by Cleaveland with .276, and Bert Kearcher with .262. Don Atkins led all pitchers by striking out 135. Atkins set new school records with the most hits, 35, and the most doubles, 10. Harper Blanchet was the stolen-base leader with 17 thefts, while Kearcher received the most bases on balls, 13.

This year's track team had a successful season under the expert coaching of Mr. Arthur T. Svensen. The team ended the season with a league record of 5-1 and an overall record of 7-3. The last meet of the year cost Regional the Conference title. The loss to Avon High School, 67-55, placed Housatonic in second place for the second year in a row.

The high spot of this year for the team, and especially for the seniors, was defeating Farmington High School by a score of 661/2-551/2. It was the first time in six years that Regional has defeated Farmington.

During the season, seven records were broken. Senior Bob Stone broke the javelin and the discus records. He later broke his discus record again in the State Meet at New Haven. Captain Joe Golden broke his own 440 record. Junior Don Hurlbutt broke his triple jump record. The quartet of Gordon Pitcher, Rodney Clark, Joe Golden, and Tim Redlund broke the relay record.
