Arboretum Committee Wages War On Invasives

The HVRHS Arboretum and Landscape Committee has initiated a program to manage and eradicate invasive vines and shrubs that are out competing our native species in the natural areas of the campus. Our recent attempt to establish the memorial grove in the vicinity of the tennis courts was thwarted by the presence of aggressive woody invasive species and especially by Asian bittersweet, causing forest collapse.

As a first step, the A&LC has engaged the Northwest Conservation District cartographer to gather field data and prepare GIS maps showing the distribution and density of **HVRHS Alumni Association**

Mahoney's son Michael,'82, said his dad, who died in the spring of 2011, would have wanted to thank everyone for their intellect, materials, labor and funds and would have been honored to be sharing the name with the Hewat family. He said the center embodies his father's philosophy of the need to teach children to learn.

Cornwall, competed on team Connecticut against 57 other teams from across the United States and Canada. They were joined by a supporting Housatonic Envirothon cast of Patricia McGuire, Sharon, Cristian Umana, Lakeville, Christian Allyn, Canaan, and Patrick Purdy, Sharon.

The team placed eighth in the competition and garnered \$5,800 in scholarships along with other Canon equipment.

Canon USA and Canon Canada, along with the Montana Conservation Districts. were the sponsors of the week -long competition, which also featured trips to Paradise Valley, Big Sky, the Gallatin and Yellowstone Rivers, Yellowstone National Park and Lewis and Clark Caverns.

More than \$100,000 dollars in scholarships Canon equipment were dis-

tributed to the top 15 teams. Envirothon is North America's largest environmental education competition for high school students featuring in- depth studies in the areas of forestry, wildlife, soils/ land-use, aquatics and a current issue, this year rangeland management.

The team focused on issues such as irrigation, proper management of rangeland, gray wolf and bison populations, and protecting Montana's fisheries, particularly the cutthroat trout population.

This is the 10th year HVRHS has participated in the Canon Environthon, having advanced to the North American competition seven times. In Manitoba, Canada, in 2006, the team placed 11th: in Geneva, N.Y., in 2007, it took first place; Flagstaff, Ariz., in 2008, brought a 16th-place finish; in Asheville, N.C., in 2009, the team placed 10th; in New Brunswick, Canada, in 2011, it was fifth, and in Selinsgrove, Penn. it placed sixth.

The competing students were sponsored by the Connecticut Envirothon and the Northwest Conservation District. The team would like to thank the greater school community for sharing its expertise in natural resource management throughout the year.


