# Preface


The Class of 1943, by following in the footsteps of the two preceding classes in publishing a yearbook, is helping to set a precedent that will probably be followed by future seniors.

## **CLASS HISTORY**

CONNIE: Hello there, John.

JOHN: Hi, Connie.

CONNIE: Well, here we are about to graduate. It doesn't seem possible that our four years here are over. You know—the Class of '43 is the first class to complete the entire four years at H. V. R. H. S.

JOHN: Yes, that is true. It is also the smallest graduating class, for many of our boys have left to serve their country.

CONNIE: Do you remember September 25, 1939?

JOHN: Do I! That was the first day of high school. I'll never forget the expressions on our classmates' faces. Remember how Hector Chauvin got lost, and was finally found wandering around the balcony in the gym?

CONNIE: (Laughing) Oh yes, a group of girls were wondering who the extremely tall, thin man was walking down the corridor; they later found out that it was Mr. Stoddard.

JOHN: We had to pick our way along the corridors, for the floors had not been laid. In fact, the whole building was far from completion.

CONNIE: Our Freshman year was probably the most exciting, for everything was strange, the new building, new teachers, new classmates. We didn't have any rules then, but oh, how they have piled up since!

JOHN: Our teachers had a hard time trying to keep our attention. We were all fascinated by the workmen. Painters were balancing on high ladders. Carpenters were pounding outside the door. WPA workers were leaning on their shovels just outside the windows.

CONNIE: I can remember edging my way down the corridor near the shop where the lockers were standing end to end. What a clanging they made when they were hammered into place! We were able to live over the confusion of finishing this building, and eventually swung into our stride. Our only activity was the Glee Club—

JOHN: But that was compulsory! Of course the girls enjoyed it—but the boys—if they could sing they wouldn't, and if they couldn't they wouldn't anyway, and if they didn't sing they invented other distractions. On the whole we were rather unimportant.

CONNIE: Except in sports—after all didn't we have our Bill Fowlkes, who managed to help keep the bench warm on the J. V., and how about the girls in the Freshman and Senior play-off? We felt mighty proud to have the opportunity of playing with that senior team.

JOHN: (teasingly) And what was the score?

CONNIE: Oh, well, we did take a shellacking, but that's not the point.

JOHN: During our Sophomore year the school activities began to organize. Our Bob Simonton was the Secretary of the Future Farmers of America. Betty Mazur and Alverda Hurlburt both held offices in the Homemakers' club.

CONNIE: Yes—and the Student Council was formed with our Mary Richardson as secretary. Our Sophomore year saw Bill Fowlkes, Frank Hitchcock, and Hector Chauvin as "fighting mad" players on the soccer team.

JOHN: Shag Fowlkes played basketball so well on the J. V., that he became a substitute on the Varsity.

CONNIE: Yes, and you didn't do so badly on the J. V. yourself. I can remember Hector's stumbling all over the floor, and Hitchcock's long shots that never reached the basket.

JOHN: Bill Fowlkes represented our class on the baseball team, and helped the team to win its first championship.

CONNIE: The high-light of our Junior year was, of course, the Junior Prom, which proved to be a great success under the chairmanship of Frank Hitchcock.

JOHN: Mr. Smith, our man of many trades, kept the committees in good humor with his practical jokes.

CONNIE: Mary Patterson was chosen Queen of the Prom, and six other Junior girls acted as attendants.

JOHN: Four members were chosen to the National Honor Society. The Airplane Club was organized and directed by Mr. Dorsett. Several girls were taking Home Nursing.

CONNIE: The Junior Year was the girls' biggest year in the line of sports for they participated in softball. soccer, and basketball. Alverda Hurlburt was our outstanding athlete.

JOHN: It was the year for the boys, too. Track was made a Varsity sport. Chesebro and Simonton ran the 1-mile in 5 minutes flat. Kimble, Simonton, and Chesebro were the high falutin' kickers of the soccer team.

CONNIE: That's right—and our boys made up the biggest part of the basketball teams. Stanton, Fowlkes, and you. John, played as regulars on the Varsity, while Kimble, Kenny, Hitchcock, Chauvin and Simonton played on the J. V. If I remember correctly, John, you didn't win too many games.

JOHN: No, we didn't, but we did play hard to keep up the school spirit. We did better in baseball though—won most of the games.

CONNIE: Our Senior year presented the most problems. At this stage of our history we became the most important part of the school. We were together in one homeroom for the first time. We became familiar with the teachers, and as it was our last year, we endeavored to make the most of it.

JOHN: At our first class meeting, we elected George Kimble as our president, Phyllis Derigon as vice-president, and Anna Lynehan our secretary. We'll never forget the "order" we had at our class meetings. The Student Council under George Kimble, the French Club under Jean Hemmerly, and the Commercial Club were all functioning smoothly. Mary Patterson with the help of Mrs. Camp and all the future poets and authors made *The Northwest Corner* a real success.

CONNIE: Yes—Stanley Turkiewicz was elected editor of the Year Book. a job if there ever was one. Two new courses were offered to the seniors—Aero-

nautics and Problems of the Western Hemisphere. Late in April. Mr. Stoddard announced the good news of the arrival of our long waited-for class rings, which we could have C. O. D. Eight members were elected to the National Honor Society.

JOHN: Because of the oil shortage we had an enforced vacation for which we went to school on Saturdays to get in our 180 days. That sure was hectic during the fishing season! We were rather unfortunate to be seniors this year for many senior activities, such as the Senior Play, formal dances, and a class trip could not take place.

CONNIE: Of course we made up for them a little by having the Senior Class Assembly, and Play Day. It was too bad we were unable to participate in sports this year, for we certainly have some A-1 material for an outstanding athletic record. If we had participated, I wonder who the stars would have been?

JOHN: Well. I'm sure Bill Fowlkes would have been made captain of the Varsity basketball team.

CONNIE: Yes, I guess that's right. Bill Stanton, Bob Simonton, and you. John, would probably have been the stars along with Kimble and Kenny.

JOHN: I bet Mary Richardson. Anna Lynehan, Betty Mazur, Barbara Stradinger, and Olive Hotaling would have helped cheer our team to victory.

CONNIE: Too bad—no bus rides. Bill Fowlkes would have been captain of the baseball team also. Simonton, in his Babe Ruth style, would have hit our home runs. Bill Stanton would have been our tall, lanky, good-looking pitcher. With you on second base, Turkiewicz on third and Chauvin out in the field—catching fly balls (one way or another) we would have had a winning team, I'm sure.

JOHN: Our class history wouldn't be complete without at least mentioning our cramming for the final exams. Class Night is important to us—but Graduation—that's the most important part of all. We feel proud to have the honor of graduating from the first Regional High School in the New England states.

CONNIE: Before us is college, work, or the armed service. We will always remember our happy days at H. V. R. H. S. We wish to thank all our teachers who have tried hard to prepare us for our place in the world. Some of you we have known for four years, others only one. Some of our former teachers have left, but I'm sure we will remember each of you, and all the "little" things that you have done for us.

JOHN: To our underclassmen we wish the best of luck throughout your high school career. We hope that you will enjoy yourselves as much as we have. We didn't have the opportunity to set any records in the line of sports, so we hope you will carry on for us and keep up the good sportsmanship we have had in our four years. 
## **Aeronautics Class**

## Service Flag


Room 103, with Mr. Smith as homeroom teacher, has been outstanding throughout the year. One of its achievements has been the purchase of a Service Flag for the school.



The Spiffy Spinster's Sewing Society. (Ha, ha! Well-?)


