




Dr. Paul W. Stoddard has served as principal of the Housatonic Valley Regional High School since it opened in the fall of 1939. Under his guidance, the school has achieved a scholastic and community standing of which the Regional District can well be proud.

The purpose of the Regional District has been to provide educational facilities that the individual towns could not afford. The Regional High School Board, the administration, and the faculty have all directed their efforts to fulfill this aim.

The school has grown so greatly in the past sixteen years that an addition was started in the fall of 1950 and completed in 1952. We also have secured a spacious auditorium, with an organ largely financed by student funds and donations. The auditorium was completed at Christmas, 1952, with the organ installed later and dedicated in 1954. The addition of the new wing and the auditorium has provided the most modern facilities for our fast-growing school.

Members are awarded a gold pin, a membership card, and certificate of membership at a school assembly held late in May.






To become a member, a student must earn a letter in one of the four varsity sports — basketball, football, baseball, or track. This includes both team members and managers.


The Pep Club grew in size and spirit this year, under the guidance of Miss Dodd. Its main purpose was to persuade the student body to attend sports events and support the school teams.





Hard workouts and high morale gave the team a burning desire to win. When the big moment finally came, Regional lost no time in gaining ground and led at the half by a score of 14-6. Three touchdowns, a conversion, and a safety gave Regional's jubilantly victorious team 21 points to win.

The backfield should be credited with doing a fine job while the line excelled, especially on defense. As one sports writer said, "For a team that had yet to win its first game, Regional showed tremendous spirit, yelling and fighting-



The team performed so well that it entered the State Championship Meet at New Haven.


