September 1945 - We were finally living! Freshmen at HVRHS! Were we thrilled! Upperclassmen sending us to the elevators and the third floor for classes, ridicule in general, and a swell time!

We, the class of ' 49 , entered the halls of HVRMS to find three upper classes of wellmeaning students, and a faculty of well-informed and excellent teachers. Our class was the largest ever to start at Regional, then in 1945, and we were very proud of it.

During the summer, the war had ceased and celebrations of peace and rehabilitation were under way.

Fred Perkins and Sally Brooks were elected to the Student Council to represent our class.

This year saw an amazing year of basketball headed by Captains Clay and O'Hara and Coach Travis. With only two defeats, we realized our prowess in a powerful team.

The baseball team did an excellent job, walking away with the Housatonic Valley League Championship, as did the basketball team.

The seniors in Room 106 made ready for us a fine freshman dance. We all became acquainted and many friendships sprang up.

Parents' Night was an extra big feature at the end of our freshman year. It gave our parents a chance to see just how much progress we had made during the year.
"Our Town" by Thornton Wilder was the senior play that year, headed by Mr. Healy and Mr. Wood.

September 1946 - Our class - well, most of the class - took to the air and alighted on the second floor to be dubbed 'sophomores.'

Returning in the fall of 1946, we were a mighty proud little school, with photos of the school and students featured in the magazine "Look" in an article "The Hope of American Education."

We gained several new members in the faculty, including Mr. Dorsett, our new viceprincipal; Mr. Kellogg, an excellent instructor in the field of science; Mr. Meder, our new director of music; Miss Harrington, teacher of sophomore English; and Mr. Bedirii, our new coach, replacing Mr. Travis. All the girls were simply ga-ga over the new coach, but soon all calmed down.

We gazed around in dismay to find we had lost from the faculty Miss Fowler, Mrs. Lockhart, Mrs. A. R. Travis, and Mrs. G. D. Travis.

Fred Perkins, Jean Leffingwell, Bob Baldwin, and Milton Van Vlack were elected to the Student Council to represent our sophomore class.

In the fall of 1946, Coach Bedini inaugurated our first six-man football team. Headed by Captain Marcon, the team ended a thrilling season in second place in the league.

Another event inaugurated in our sophomore year was the annual Carnival Ball, sponsored by the Student Council, and proving to be a great benefit to the various clubs in the school. New Orleans Mardi Gras was the theme of this, our first Carnival Ball.

At Christmas time, Mr. Meder presented his glee club in a gala Christmas assembly, much enjoyed by all. Of course, at Christmas, we held our big sophomore dance in Sophomore Alley. (For Sophomores Only.)

The senior play presented in our sophomore year was "Junior Miss," a rollicking comedy, directed by Mr. Healy.

During the year, a small drama group, also under the direction of Mr. Healy, presented the play "Trifles" in a contest at Danbury. Although not the winners, they finished quite near the top.

The year ended with our baseball team again coming out with the championship, the track team placing third in the state track meet, and the basketball team doing a fine job, winning fifteen games out of twenty.

September 1947 - Upperclassmen at last! Being a larger class than the seniors, we moved into Room 106, sending the class of ' 48 back to their junior homerooms. With Mr. Dorsett heading the class, we proceeded into an eventful year.

This year, several new members were added to the faculty while several others left. Miss Meehan returned as Dean of Girls and instructor of social studies; Mr. Just, instructor of mathematics; Mr. Eldridge, instructor of English; Mr. Broere, instructor of industrial arts; Mr. Wogan, instructor of science; and Miss Estey, instructor of French, Latin, and English.

Much to our dismay we found that Mr. Kellogg, Miss Harrington, Mr. Healy, Mrs. Fitts, Mr. Perkins, and Mr. Winter had left us. Also, we found that Miss Collins was now Mrs. Graham, graciously condescending to remain as an instructor in home economics.

Barbara Harvey and Eleanor Coons were our new representatives to the Student Council this year.

In the late fall, the play, "Nothing But the Truth," directed by Miss Allyn, was presented by the senior class. It was an exciting comedy which Johnny Leffingwell led to a gay success.

The football team, in its second year, captain by Joe Solan, won three of nine contests, putting on a good show for the small size of our team.

Winter saw the junior assembly, a mimicry of a radio program, with the whole class taking part in the show. Of course, we can't forget Ray Baldesseri and Babs McLane doing the "Dum Dot Song."

The second annual Carnival Ball, with the theme of the circus train, was given on Valentine's Day, a very appropriate time. Everyone enjoyed immensely the intermission show put on by the Regional students. Something new this year was the shower of balloons at midnight.

The basketball team showed us a fine season with thirteen out of nineteen games won, while the baseball team went ahead to clinch the championship again.

In May of '48, we held our gala Cinderella Prom, with Barbara Harvey and Ray Baldesseri as co-chairmen, Mrs. Segalla, faculty adviser, and Clara Schumann, a very lovely queen, surrounded by her eight no less lovely attendants.

We left our junior year in '48, hating to see the class of '48 leave; among these students were many friends.

September 1948 - Seniors! And what a year this was to be! Back we went to the old hunting grounds in Room 106 with "Ricky" heading the pack. The year started with a bang; psychology and $\mathrm{H}_{2} \mathrm{O}$ of chemistry laboratory.

A new system was started this year with the cheerleaders having two separate squads: one for football and one for basketball.

The football season proved fruitful with five wins out of eight games, headed by co-captains Elton Nolan and Forest Washington.

Three new representatives to the Student Council were elected from the senior class: Eugene O'Meara, Paul Minacci, and Sally Platt.

At Christmas time, Mr. Meder and his well-trained glee club produced an impressive assembly, based on the arrival of the Three Kings.

Much to the disappointment of many of the students, but actually for our own good, we found that hereafter, there will be no exemptions from the final examinations. The object of this decision is to prepare us more for college and the rigorous tests necessary to undergo there.

Magazine sales hit a new high this year with a $\$ 2000$ intake. Marjorie Dean was the top salesman and winner of a prized wrist watch.

February 26 saw the end of a long, eventful basketball season under the captainship of Robert Baldwin. With the jinx running true to form, Regional was nosed out of the tournament in its first game, ending the season with nine wins out of nineteen games.

Under chairman Brian Stanton, the Senior Ball, on February S, proved to be a successful event. The theme followed the pattern of a gala winter wonderland.

This year, for the first time, The Northwest Corner spread out its editing staff to all four classes instead of just to the senior class. This gives all the students a chance to help in the publication of a good school newspaper.

In March a gala Roman banquet was put on by the Latin Club in the gymnasium. All the customs of the old time Roman banquet were presented for the edification of the spectators and the club members themselves.

The annual Carnival Ball took place on March 26, with the theme of a Mexican fiesta. A prize was given to the best performer during the intermission and also to the person who guessed who the Carnival Caballero was. Mr. Wood's Fun House again took first prize for the most original and best decorated booth.

April 12 saw the tenth anniversary of the laying of the cornerstone of the Regional High School. A celebration for next fall is being planned for the tenth anniversary of the opening of the school. There are a number of articles contained within the cornerstone box pertaining to the school and surrounding areas on or about the date.

The comedy "Fly Away Home," directed by Mrs. James W. Harvey of Lakeville, which was presented on Broadway some years before, proved to be a huge success.

As we, the class of ' 49 , are leaving good old Regional, we wish to express our sincere thanks and gratitude for all the splendid privileges and guidance granted us by our faculty advisers. To the townspeople and parents, we would like to say, "Thanks, for a beautiful and well-equipped school." With sad hearts and long lasting memories, we leave, taking up careers in all phases of life. To be sure, the memory of Housatonic Valley Regional High School will forever remain in our hearts.

The latter envisioned about a hundred goals of which the most important were as follows: to have projects; to purchase goods co-operatively; to do dairy herd improvement work for farmers; to enter the Vo-Ag Day contests at Storrs; to raise cash crops; to have a Father and Son banquet; to make a scrap book of all activities; to admit honorary members; to maintain fire crews; to have a basketball team; to repair the F.F.A. farm shop.

Shortly after its organization the F.F.A. acquired a barn for a farm shop. Since it was in bad repair, the floor was strengthened, the roof mended, a chimney built, and doors and windows adjusted by members of the group. The shop has been wired for electricity and some painting has been done.

The chapter now owns a great variety of tools and working materials as well as a 1929 Reo truck.

The Housatonic Valley Chapter of Future Farmers of America is the only chapter in Connecticut that has won the Silver Emblem for accomplishing high standards of workmaniship in the goals that they have set up. They have won several Bronze Emblem Ratings and several honorable certificates. The F.F.A. won the Poultry Plaque in 1947 for the third time which makes them full owners of it. They have also won a cup for showmanship in dairy cattle and two sweepstakes banners. In 1948 they won the showmanship cup for the first time in several years. If won twice more, the cup will belong permanently to the F.F.A. All of these trophies were won at Storrs.

The F.F.A. this year was composed of thirty-seven members. The chapter met twice a month for a business and recreational meeting. The officers were as follows: William Mott, president; Donald Vaill, vicepresident; Frank Rosseter, secretary; William Breakell, treasurer; Mr. Clarke B. Wood, instructor and adviser; William Wilson, reporter; and Thomas Solan, sentinel.

## RESUME OF THE BASKETBALL SEASON

Regional completed the 1948-1949 season with nine wins and nine losses besides another defeat in the state tourney at New Britain. This gamewas played against Abbott Tech. It was a close contest up to the half, but then Danbury pulled away and finished the game 41-43.

Eight of the games were non-league. Housatonic won seven of the ten league games, putting her in a second place tie. The defeat that Regional handed Terryville in the next to the last game of the season made Regional eligible for the state tournament.

Opening the season with three defeats in a row from Simsbury, Stockbridge, and Pittsfield, Regional felt downhearted. But in her fourth game the Regionalites retaliated, conquering Litchfield by a score of $50-35$.

Next, Housatonic took two victories in succession, one from Washington at Washington 42-21, and the other from Woodbury by a score of $38-17$, also away.

Taking on Ellsworth on Ellsworth's own court, Regional bowed to the top flight class "C" quintet by a score of 35-20. The following game also proved disappointing as Lee High of Massachusetts trounced Regional 36-18. In the next contest Housatonic was again defeated, this time by her number one enemy, Thomaston. The game was played at the Thomaston gym. The final score was: The Bears 28, Regional 16.

The next five games were played on Regional's home court, giving the Regionalites heart after losing three games, one after another. The Mountaineers came back
to life in the first of the series by taking Terryville $46-22$. The second was against the Wolcott boys who put up a good fight but finally bowed to Regional's attack during the last quarter with a final of $48-33$. The third was a team Regional wanted badly to beat after being defeated by it by a margin of four points. This was Stockbridge. The Regionalites put all they had into that game, upsetting the Stockbridge boys 43-38. The fourth game against Washington was colossal. The Regional men trounced the Washington Varsity with a startling score of $80-38$. The last of the five was played against Woodbury. This contest also chalked up another victory for Housatonic by a score of 57-27.

The Mountaineers went off to play Litchfield in the following contest and was the victim of one of the season's upsets as Litchfield pushed the Regionalites under, 33-28. Going to Massachusetts for a return game with Lee High proved to be a fruitless struggle for Regional as Lee High won with a score of 52-32.

At Terryville for a return match, Regional again defeated the Orange and Black, 49-43. This was the only overtime game of the season.

In the last game of the season, except for the tournament, Thomaston showed its strength as the Bears trampled the Blue and Gold, 42-36.

For the season as a whole, the Mountaineers won 6 and lost 3 games on their home court and outscored their opponents 398 to 306.
