## Warren C. Clark

September 5, 1906 - December 22, 1966

Our school year was deeply saddened when Warren C. Clark, vice-principal in charge of adult education and teacher of social studies at Housatonic, died December 22, 1966.

Mr. Clark was born in Portsmouth, New Hampshire. He received his A.B. degree from Dartmouth College in 1928 and his M.Ed. degree from the University of New Hampshire in 1933. He taught from 1929 to 1932 in Stamford, Connecticut, and worked in the life insurance business for some years before coming to our school in 1942.

A sports-minded man, Mr. Clark assisted with coaching football here and served as waterfront director at Camp Workcoeman. He was later a familiar figure as the life guard at Lake Wononscopomuc in Lakeville.

For twenty-five years Mr. Clark taught courses in world history, U.S. history, geography, and twen-tieth-century history to hundreds of students in this school. He also organized a highly successful program of adult education which he faithfully supervised two nights a week year in and year out. In school circles he was especially well known for his enthusiastic contribution to the interscholastic forum for the discussion of important current issues. He not only coached debating teams from our own school but also gave important leadership to other schools in this area.

Housatonic feels profoundly the loss of Warren C. Clark but is richer for the devoted service he rendered.

Just living in another land for two months has given me a better understanding of the world. I owe much to AFS and to this school which gives strong support to this organization.
