

EUGENE BROOKS DEDICATION SET FOR HOMECOMING

It is to be known as the Eugene Brooks Faculty Courtyard. As one faces the entry to the auditorium, it is the courtyard to the left. When Gene Brooks served as Assistant Principal from 1985 to 1995, his office windows looked out onto that courtyard.

He would be so proud to see it now. On Saturday, April 12, a work crew under the direction of Paul and Lisa Church '79 transformed that courtyard into a beautiful landscape for all seasons. The workers getting their hands dirty that day ranged in age from the early teens to approaching seventy. Arborist Scott Monroe '70 stopped by to offer advice and assistance with the birch tree that stands as the centerpiece of the courtyard. Joining the work party in the afternoon was Dolora Brooks, one of Gene's daughters and the mother of his two beloved granddaughters, who contributed a sculpture to be placed in the courtyard.

This entire effort was organized by a committee of the HVRHS Faculty Association chaired by Cathy Wheeler. teacher of German and Special Education. Serving on the committee are current and past staff members Holly Adams, Mark Burdick, Linda Everett, Michael Guy, John L. Mahoney, Bunny McGuire, David Moran, Frank Ruotolo, Ellery Sinclair, George Wheeler, Kevin Wheeler and Katie Snyder Gannett, now chair of the Region One School Board. The ceremony dedicating the courtyard in Gene's memory will take place during Homecoming Weekend at 11 AM on Saturday, October 18. Everyone is warmly invited to come and participate as we pay tribute to the man who served the Housatonic

community so well for ten years. His favorite saying (and he had many!) was, "We serve the children." And serve them he did.

OLIVER F. ELDRIDGE 1915-2003

Oliver Eldridge, English teacher at HVRHS from 1947 to 1957, died on February 13 of this year at Noble Horizons in Salisbury. Just one week earlier he had so impressed Fred Gobillot '52 with his incredible memory of where Fred had sat some fifty years before in his English class.

Oliver Eldridge was an extraordinary man. He served in the U.S. Navy during World War II both as a signalman on a tanker in the North Atlantic and, later, as a lieutenant junior grade on an LST in the Pacific. Upon leaving HVRHS in 1957 he joined the Canaan Savings Bank. By 1964 he was president and remained in the position until 1975, when the bank merged with State Bank for Savings. He was then elected vice president and manager of the Canaan office and a trustee of State Bank. He retired in 1980.

But he was also a poet and writer who published "Beach Grass," a collection of the poetry written over his lifetime. And he was an award-winning grower of irises whose iris garden on Granite Avenue in Canaan was visited each spring by flower lovers. And he was a bee keeper who sold his honey under the label "Land of Canaan."

In the school year 1965-66 Oliver and wife Louise opened their home to an AFS student from Guatemala, Martin Argueta. Daughter Nancy had graduated with the Class of '65, and son Rob '67 was a junior that year. Martin went on to graduate with the Class of '66 and a strong bond was formed between him and the Eldridge family. This bond was so strong that, when a memorial service was held for Oliver in May, Martin Argueta came all the way from Guatemala to attend.

HALL OF FAME PROCEDURES AND CRITERIA

PROCEDURES

- As we shall continue to accept rolling applications each year, there will be no deadline for applications.
- The committee meets to consider nominations in June of each year, which terminates the process for that year's nominees.
- It is the responsibility of the HVRHS Director of Athletics to convene the committee each year.
- The induction ceremony will be held in November for 2003. A decision will be made later by the full committee as to whether elections shall continue on a yearly basis.
- Nominators must provide pertinent information re their nominees on the nominations sheet.

CRITERIA

- Ordinarily, a candidate/athlete must be a graduate of HVRHS, but exceptions can be made.
- An athlete becomes eligible for nomination five years after leaving HVRHS.
- In most cases participation in more than one sport will be a requirement for membership.
- An athlete's successful participation in sports beyond high school is a plus when he/she is considered for membership.

In addition to outstanding athletic performance, an athlete must have made a positive contribution to the efforts of his/her team.




Alumni, Thanks For Your Help!
