75th Anniversary Celebration

Plans are underway for a gala celebration to mark the 75th anniversary of the opening of Housatonic Valley Regional High School. The event will be held Saturday, Sept. 20.

The seeds of the school were planted in September 1937 when the state approved the formation of the regional school district and the land on which the campus sits was purchased from the Lorch family.

The laying of the cornerstone was held April 2, 1939 during a wet, snowy day. Six hundred people turned out to witness the event. Eighteen items from the time were placed in a copper box by a large derrick. The box was then covered with cement and a large piece of granite was set over the cornerstone.

The school opened Sept. 25, 1939 with Dr. Paul W. Stoddard as its principal. The teaching staff numbered 19. Ten buses brought in 384 students from the six

towns. The first commencement exercise was held June 21, 1940 with 70 students receiving diplomas.

Housatonic Welcomes a New Principal

Housatonic Valley Regional High School students will be greeted by a new principal when they return from summer vacation this year. Jose Martinez was named the school's top administrator in the spring. Former Principal Matthew Hartnett resigned in August 2013 to take a position in Bristol. Vice Principal Ian Strever stepped up to become the interim principal and Liam O'Reilly, a special education teacher, moved into Mr. Strever's slot as assistant principal.

Dr. Martinez's last post was at Nonnewaug High School in Woodbury. Raised in Syracuse and Fishkill, N.Y., he graduated from Binghamton University with a bachelor's degree in biochemistry. He earned his master's degree in teaching from Manhattanville College, his administrator's certificate from Southern Connecticut State University and his doctorate in education from Central Connecticut State University. A

resident of Bethlehem, he and his wife, Annemarie, have two grown children, Joseph and Rebecca.

When asked about his role at Housatonic, Dr. Martinez said, "I want to open its doors and show it off; tout what makes it special. I also want to

Arborists Spruce Up Campus

Areas around the high school received a spring cleaning when several local arborists - some of them alumni - volunteered their time. Under the supervision of Tom Zetterstrom, '63, representatives from Applewood Tree Care, Perotti Tree Surgeons, Toomey Tree Care and Town Hill Services, pruned several trees that dot the site and administered deep root feeding. A cross section of students watched the proceedings and those in the agriculture education department's landscape design and construction class helped out.

The exercise was part of Earth Day, said ag-ed teacher David Moran. Mr. Zetterstrom talked to students, explaining, "What we're doing is making the campus look pretty and eliminating hazardous branches," he said. The activity was also in preparation for the 75th anniversary celebration.

Mr. Zetterstrom is an award-winning photographer of trees. In 1999 he founded Elm Watch, a nonprofit, volunteer citizens group with the mission of preserving heritage elms. "Earth Day was formed in 1970 and its defines my life quite a bit," he told the students.

The volunteers trimmed a white oak and beech tree, which are in an area in front of the central office wing. They also removed a birch in the courtyard and worked on two flowering dogwoods that flank the front doors of the school.

As he looked around at the group hard at work, Mr. Zetterstrom commented, "It is great to have people come back and take pride in their school."

In addition, Ed and Mary (Tobin) Kirby, '45, along with former English teacher Russ Coward, have updated a history of the school that was first published for the 50th anniversary in 1989, and committees of the alumni board prepared a 75th anniversary yearbook which includes highlights of each graduating class starting with the class of 1940. The two publications are for sale and information on how to purchase them, as well as details of the event, can be found on the association's website, hvrhsalumni.org.

The committee looks forward to seeing a large turnout to help Housatonic commemorate this momentous occasion.

1940s




