The Wolfpack opened the season on the wrong foot with a defeat at the hands of Simsbury by a score of 49-36. Regional's next game was with a much stronger team, Pittsfield, Massachusetts, to whom they lost by a score of 58-29.

The Reggies then played Watertown in their first league game of the season, and again went down to defeat by the slim margin of one point, 41-40.

The team finally broke into the winning column in the fourth game with a smashing victory over Washington High by a score of 48 -14. The Blue and Gold went down to defeat in their fifth game of the season, this time to the sharpshooting Millbrook, New York, team.

Regional found Terryville invading the Housatonic gym for their next game, but when the final gun was sounded, Regional was the victor by a 37 32 score.

In the next game of the season, the Wolfpack found themselves up against the defending champions. Thomaston, playing like champions throughout, conquered the "Pack" by a score of 56-50.

Regional, returning from Christmas vacation, found the toughest week of the season before them with Lee High, of Massachusetts, as the opponent for Tuesday night, and Ellsworth High of South Windsor on Friday night. And tough it proved to be, with Lee beating the Reggies by a 36-31 score, and Ellsworth defeating them by a $38-32$ score.

The Regionalites then started playing the type of ball that they were capable of playing all season by winning their next five games. Included in this streak were victories over Litchfield, Watertown, Lee. Washington, and Terryville.

The next game on the Blue and Gold's tough schedule was another meeting with their number one rival, Thomaston. Thomaston again conquered the Wolfpack by a $52-39$ score.

Regional then defeated Oliver Wolcott Tech by an overwhelming score of 47-20. Then came the return game against the Millbrook, New York, team, which again posted another victory over Coach Bedini's charges, this time by a $52-43$ score. Litchfield
was the only game left to be played and Regional needed this game in order to qualify for the state tournament. Litchfield was leading Regional at the halfway mark but a spirited Regional team came back to conquer Litchfield by a 55-51 score.

At the end of the regular season Frank Miller and Richard Thurston were re-elected co-captains for next year.

## RESUME OF THE FOOTBALL SEASON

Six-man football was again resumed at Regional in the fall of 1949. The fourth football season proved to be quite successful although the Blue and Gold lost three and tied for second place with Bethel.

The Blue and Gold ushered in the 1949 season by playing host to a strong Bethel team, who suffered a defeat by a score of 28 to 8 . The Wolfpack played a much superior game showing that Coach Bedini had the boys in excellent condition.

In the second game Regional ventured to Newtown, where our team proved to be in command by trouncing the Hawley High boys 52-26. This score of 52 points set a new scoring record at Regional, topping the previous by two points.

For the season's third game Regional played a much weaker opponent, Washington High. The Blue and Gold came through with an overwhelming victory of 36-2.

Regional experienced its first defeat of the season from a much heavier New Milford team. The game was a heart breaker to lose because if the boys had won that game, it would probably have meant the championship or at least a tie with New Milford. The opponents greatly outweighed the Regional grid boys, and the game ended with a final score of 21-14.

The next contest was played on the home field against a once defeated Newtown team. The Wolfpack bounced back from their New Milford defeat by trouncing Newtown again 31-12.

With the new record of four and one the Regional boys played Washington, a very much underrated team, on the field of the Blue and White. This game proved to be a very bitter one, for although the boys played a hard-fought game, it ended in a 12-12 tie. This is the first tie ever encountered by a Regional football team.

In the final two games of the season Regional was defeated by both New Milford and Bethel in succession. The Green and White again proved fatal to Regional by beating us $28-18$. The unexpected defeat by Bethel by a score of 20-16 ended the Wolfpack's season with four wins, three defeats, and one tie. Regional scored 207 points to 129 for their opponents. Jack Sondrini and Bob McGuire were elected co-captains of the 1950 team at the close of the year.

## THE HISTORY OF THE F.F.A.

Courses in vocational agriculture were first established in 1917. Within a few years, almost every state in the union had so-called agricultural clubs, which were composed of the boys taking vocational agriculture. These organizations were largely social and recreational in nature, but certain educational improvement, and co-operative features were usually included as well.

As the number of organizations grew, the idea of organizing the individual clubs into a state organzation resulted in the "Future Farmers of America."

In November 1928, the first national convention was held. Since that time, the FFA has steadily and rapidly expanded, extending to Hawaii and Puerto Rico. There are even similar organizations in foreign countries.

The national emblem of the FFA which is used by all members of FFA organizations has a definite meaning. It is composed of five symbols: the owl, which is symbolic of knowledge and wisdom; the plow, symbol of labor and tillage of the soil; the
learned to co-operate; the cross section of an ear of corn represents common agriculture interests, because corn is native to America and is grown in every state; and the eagle, symbolic of the national scope of the organization.

The Housatonic Valley Chapter FFA is composed of about thirty-five members and meets twice monthly for business meetings. ## CLASS HISTORY

As the Pilgrims came to Plymouth, Massachusetts, in sixteen hundred and twenty, so the freshmen to Regional in September, nineteen hundred and fortysix. Like them we were unsure of the events that were to befall us in our next four years.

Our first weeks as freshmen found class and Student Council elections taking place. Those elected to represent the freshmen in the Student Council were Allyn Fenn and Louis Minatti.

This year was also the first for some of the members of the faculty. Those were Miss Harrington, who was to teach sophomore English; Mr. Bedini, the new physical education instructor; Mr. Meder, director of music; Mr. Kellogg, our new science teacher; and Mr. Dorsett, who was reappointed and became vice principal.

Among other firsts for this year was the Carnival Ball, which was sponsored by the Student Council, The theme was the New Orleans Mardi Gras, and the event, itself a financial success, served to introduce the freshmen to one of the many social activities of the school.

That Christmas, a very effective assembly was presented by the Future Homemakers of America. It was entitled "World Christmas Festival." The program was planned and directed by Mrs. Graham, and the costumes were created by Miss Kingsbury. The Glee Club, under the direction of Mr. Meder, sang Christmas carols.

For the first time in our sports activities, a sixman football team appeared. It was started by our new coach and took second place in the league. In
the winter season the basketball team rose to the top, taking second place in the league after winning fifteen games out of twenty. That spring our baseball team won the championship, and our track team placed third in the state track meet.

When we returned to good old HVRHS in the fall of 1947, we were placed on the second floor and given the royal title of sophomores. Six new teachers had been added to the faculty. Miss Meehan returned as dean of girls; Miss Estey, to teach French, English, and Latin; Mr. Wogan, for science; Mr. Eldridge. who was to teach English and become faculty adviser for the school paper; Mr. Broere, for industrial arts; and Mr. Just, who was to teach mathematics.

Student Council elections in our sophomore year gave us Ginger Mercer and Anne Knibloe as our two new representatives.

In October our first chance to put on something really big was at hand. It was decided that a corridor party, which had been started by the sophomores of the last year, was to be held in the form of a Hallowe'en party. We all enjoyed dancing in the hall and playing games in the individual homerooms.

That fall after school activities were started, we learned that our small football team had edged its way into third place. Our basketball team that winter of 1947-48 won thirteen out of nineteen games played, placing second; while the baseball team was again first.

The second annual Carnival Ball was held in the theme of a circus train. A new attraction was also added that year - a shower of balloons from the ceiling at exactly midnight.

The juniors in the spring presented the annual Junior Prom in the form of a "Cinderella Ball."

As it was nearing the end of our sophomore year, we all anticipated being upper classmen, provided we passed our final exams.

We entered school in September, 1948, with the noble title of juniors and found ourselves scattered in three homerooms. All together we totaled seventyfive students.

Our faculty, we discovered, had another member, Mr. Miller. He was to teach industrial arts and also the new subject of driver education.

Student Council elections were held again and Lois Miller, Alec Frost, and Joyce Aakjar were chosen to represent us as juniors.

At Christmas the Future Homemakers of America again presented the World Christmas Festival under the direction of Mrs. Graham and Miss Kingsbury. Mr. Meder's glee club sang Christmas carols and a few Christmas selections at the assembly, the theme of which was "The Arrival of the Three Kings." The costumes were artfully designed and beautifully made by Miss Kingsbury.

This year our football team emerged victorious in second place and I think their success was due in part to the new cheerleading system. There were two cheerleading squads, one for football and one for basketball. This helped raise the boys' morale. Our basketball team this winter captured second place after losing a heartbreaker in the tournament. Their record was nine wins out of nineteen games played. As the year drew to a close our famous baseball team again won the championship and first place.

The NORTHWEST CORNER, our school newspaper recorganized its editing staff so that its members came from all four classes instead of the senior class as formerly. It proved to be a successful arrange-
ment as it enabled all classes to provide individual material for the paper.

Mr. Broere and his advanced industrial arts class surprised us all when we returned from vacation. Each boy made a brass letter, which, when all were completed, would help form the words Housatonic Valley Regional High School. They were placed above the portico of the school to identify the building to all passersby.

In March, the Latin Club presented a Roman banquet complete "ab ovo usque ad mala." Everyone was dressed in Roman costumes, and Roman customs were followed. For entertainment there were tumbling by two members of the club, and the traditional dice rolling to choose the Rex Bibendi (King of Drinking).

That spring our junior class presented the junior assembly under the direction of Mr. Broere, with Mary Ann Moesley as chairman. The cast included everyone in the junior class and the theme was a minstrel show. Clifford Gustafson was the interlocutor. We will never forget Mary Killawee and her special song, "All I Want for Christmas is My Two Front Teeth."

This year, on April 12, the tentin anniversary of the laying of the cornerstone of the Regional High School was observed. Celebration of the event was to be held sometime during the next school year.

The Junior Prom highlighted our junior year in May. Anne Knibloe was chosen queen to reign during the event, the theme of which was "Enchanted Evening."

September, 1949! We were at last in Room 106, the senior homeroom. This is what we had been waiting for and working toward. To add to our enthusiasm at becoming seniors, we discovered that Mr. Richardson was once again the homeroom teacher.

Pattye Lou Hansell and Bernard Miller were
chosen to represent the seniors on the Student Council
Three new teachers were present on the faculty: Mr. Tappey, teacher of science; Mr. Jackson, instructor of English; and Miss Bamforth, teacher of home economics.

This year a course, entitled Home and Family Living, was added to the curriculum, and was open to the boys.

In athletics this year both the football and basketball teams finished their seasons in second place. The latter team played one game in the state contest.

In October, we were proud to have Mrs. Franklin Delano Roosevelt speak at the tenth anniversary celebration of the school. It was very thrilling, too, for most of us, as it was the first time we had really had a chance to see her in person. After the program the home economics class served tea while Mrs. Roosevelt greeted guests.

During the evening of October 27, Parents' Night was held at school. It was the second one during our four years. Boys from the home and family living class prepared and served cookies and punch to the parents and guests.

Another important event was held on December 6 and 7. Our school was evaluated for the first time since 1941. The evaluators in their final reports indicated that our building, faculty, and student body rated very high among schools in Connecticut and the United States. This pleased us very much and we, the present senior class, are proud to be among those who helped to bring this rating to the school. We were informed, too, at this time that additional classrooms and the long-awaited auditorium were to be started soon.

At Christmas time a Christmas party was held in our senior room. Dick Massini was chairman. Mr. Meder presented a Christmas assembly, which aroused
our Christmas spirit before we left for our vacation.
As the new year started, elections were begun immediately for various activities. Rosalie Freund was elected yearbook chairman and Barbara Garrity, business manager. Mrs. Camp was asked to advise the staff on the material.

Joan Cantwell was chosen chairman of the senior play and announced that the play this year would be "Dear Ruth" and that Miss Gesell would direct it. It was presented March 24 and 25 and was a huge success.

Clifford Gustafson was elected chairman of the senior ball committee, and plans were set forth for the ball to be held March 11, which developed into dignified and beautiful dance.

Time for magazine sales was again at hand and everyone set out to sell subscritions and break last year's record of $\$ 2,000$. However, $\$ 1600$ proved to be the extent of our selling ability this year.

In keeping with the pioneer spirit of our school, the first Post of Allied Youth in Connecticut was organized during our senior year under the direction of Mr. Jackson.

As our senior year draws to a close we wish to thank each and every teacher individually who has in any way helped our senior class to its success. To our guidance teachers and other faculty members we wish to express our thanks and appreciation for their never-ending interest in us. Thanks also go to the townspeople who made it possible for us to have this beautiful school and the fine equipment which has launched us on our careers.

To Regional we say goodby, and good luck to all the students who will have the honor and privilege to say that Housatonic Valley Regional was their high school.
