
A few days before the actual performances a preview, which included scenes from different acts, was given at an assembly. This was done to stimulate the interest of the students.



RESUME OF THE BASKETBALL SEASON

Regional completed another successful season, winning thirteen games and losing six for the season as a whole, including one post-season tilt. This was a 46 to 43 thriller lost to Windsor Locks in the state tournament. Going into the last quarter, Regional was behind by the big sum of 12 points, but staged a determined rally to make a gain, although it fell short by three points.

Regional opened the season with a smashing victory over Millerton 61 to 28, and then quickly tasted defeat as Stockbridge, Mass., turned the tables and trampled the Blue and Gold, 47 to 37. Amenia was the next victory, achieved by a 47 to 22 count.

Regional then scored their biggest upset of the season in a thrilling 33 to 30 victory over Thomaston, who lost only two games all season long, the other to Ellsworth.

Regional trounced Ridgefield 43 to 25. Terryville then handed the Mountaineers their second defeat by a score of 32 to 28.

With the reopening of school following the Christmas holidays, Regional easily defeated Dover Plains, 38 to 21, and Litchfield, 65 to 38.

On January 13th, the fast-stepping quintet from Stockbridge came to Falls Village and won their second game of the season from us by 36 to 34 in an action-packed thriller.

Regional won their next two games by defeating Washington, 45 to 33, and Amenia, 33 to 28.

The toughest week of the season came up with Thomaston carded for Tuesday and Terryville to be met on Friday. And tough it proved to be. Thomaston avenged their earlier defeat by trouncing the Reggies, 49 to 32. On Friday night we lost for the second time to Terryville, 40 to 33.

Regional completed their season by winning the last four games. They defeated Litchfield, 48 to 26; Washington, 49 to 37; and Morris, 35 to 31. In the last regularly scheduled game they edged out a scrappy Dover Plains five by a close score of 29 to 28. We won this exciting game on a foul shot made by Captain Jack Dudley after the final whistle had been blown.

During the regular season Regional won 13 and lost 5 for a percentage of .722. They won 8 and lost 2 on the home court and outscored their opponents 431 to 286.

At the close of the season, guard Bob Baldwin was elected captain of the 1948-1949 squad.

RESUME OF THE FOOTBALL SEASON

Regional's second football season proved to be the exact opposite of the first one. The 1946 team won 6 games and lost 3 while this year's team won 3 games and lost 6.

The only regular left from last year's starting team was Jack Dudley, who broke his wrist in the second practice and was, therefore, unable to participate in any games.

The Mountaineers were composed of light but speedy players. On this speed was pinned all hopes for victory.

The Regional six received its first taste of experience in the opening game as it was shut out by Hawley High of Newtown, 26 to 0.

We won our first game by trampling Amenia, 43 to 19. In the third game we were defeated by New Milford, 26 to 12. The fourth game was the most exciting contest of the year as Regional edged out Bethel, 13 to 12. Bethel led at the half, 12 to 6. The Mountaineers tallied a touchdown in the final quarter, however, and tied the game up at 12. The attempted conversion was good and Regional won by a 13 to 12 count. This was the only conversion after touchdown made by either team during the game and provided the margin of victory.

Regional then lost a close one, 37 to 34, at the hands of Washington. Two more defeats were administered by New Milford and Newtown, with scores of 46 to 34 and 22 to 15, respectively.

The Blue and Gold won their third game as they trounced Bethel again, 33 to 19, but lost to Washington in the last game of the season, 55 to 28.

Elton Nolan and Forest Washington were elected co-captains of the 1948 team at the close of the year.




The first social event of the year was an Autumn Hop which was sponsored by the Council. It was a square dance with the girls coming in dirndl skirts and the boys in blue jeans.

CIVICS CLUB



FUTURE FARMERS OF AMERICA

The Housatonic Valley Chapter of Future Farmers of America received its charter on April 19, 1940. This is an organization of boys studying vocational agriculture. Courses in vocational agriculture in America were first established in 1917. Within a few years, almost every state in the union had so-called "Agricultural Clubs" which were composed of boys taking vocational agriculture. These organizations were largely social with some educational features included.

From 1923 to 1928, some states formed state organizations which were composed of members from the local chapters. The name, "Future Farmers of America," originated in Virginia.

In November, 1928, the first national convention was held. Since that time, the FFA has steadily and rapidly expanded, extending to Hawaii and Puerto Rico. There are even similar organization in foreign countries.

The national emblem of the FFA has a definite meaning. This emblem is used by members of all FFA organizations. It is composed of five symbols: the owl, which is symbolic of knowledge and wisdom; the plow, a symbol of labor and tillage of the soil; the rising sun, emblematic of progress and the new day that will dawn when all farmers are trained and have learned to co-operate; the cross section of an ear of corn, representing common agriculture interests, because corn is native in America and is grown in

every state; and the eagle, symbolic of the national scope of the organization.

The Housatonic Valley Chapter of FFA this year was composed of 35 members. The chapter met twice a month for a business and recreational meeting. The officers were as follows: Stanley Griswold, president; Allyn Hurlburt, vice-president; Raymond Adkins, secretary Joseph Honour, treasurer; Mr. Clarke B. Wood, adviser; Donald Vaill, reporter; William Breakell, sentinal.

A budget and a program of work were drawn up. The latter envisioned about ninety goals, of which the most important were as follows: to have projects; to purchase goods co-operatively; to do dairy herd improvement work for farmers; to enter the Vo-Ag day contests at Storrs; to raise cash crops; to have a father and son banquet; to make a scrapbook of all activities; to admit honorary members; to maintain fire crews; to have a basketball team.

These are only a few of the major goals which the FFA carried out. The FFA was not only rewarded financially, but was proud of winning first prize for the most original booth at the Carnival Ball. The FFA members of this school always try to do their best, regardless of the work which faces them or the problems they have to solve. The members hope that this tradition will be carried on.

To develop these aims we have planned a program to study the state and national purposes and have sent delegates to all state meetings. Our own Beverley Dalone is president of the state Girls' Club. We organized with the Junior Chapter in the World Christmas Festival for which we collected, wrapped, and sent twenty-seven packages to needy children overseas. This year we served a dinner for the Northwest Connecticut Education Association, joined with the FFA boys on a sliding party and a hay ride, and, together with the Junior Chapter, sponsored the popular "hot-dog stand" at the Carnival Ball. The profits from this were sent to the state FHA Association to help pay the expenses of the delegates to be sent to the National FHA Convention in Kansas City in July. A card party was held in April and a special Mother's Day tribute and tea in May.

This year we had ten club members. We paid dues of ten cents per month and all extra money was saved for the eventful New York trip, April 10.

When each member has completed thirty hours of training, she is awarded one academic credit and a Red Cross certificate.

- Audrey: Hasn't it, though? Well, as I wondered then, I wonder now, "What does the future hold for us?"








CLASS HISTORY

September, 1944, found a new freshman class in the Regional High School, namely ours. We were, as had been all preceding freshman classes, bewildered and quite often lost in the process of going from room to room. Many freshmen found it very embarassing when they stepped into the wrong class room and were greeted with knowing laughter from the upperclassmen.

Our initial year was one of great importance, not only for us, but also for the nation and the world as a whole. In November, the national elections were held. All the student body was interested in the outcome of this important election and many members of our class took an active part by participating in a debate sponsored by the Civics Club. On the day of elections, a vote was taken in the school, with the Republicans capturing all honors. However, the Democrats managed to stay in power throughout the nation despite the importance of our poll!

Jack Dudley and Lloyd Page were chosen by our class to represent us on the Student Council during our first year.

One of the highlights of our freshman year was the operetta, "A Waltz Dream," in which a great number of our class took part. Never to be forgotten are those rehearsals, lasting far into the night. Never to be forgotten, also, was the final production, a great success, with the fine acting and the gay, lilting music of Oscar Strauss thrilling the capacity audiences on both nights.

The school band was organized during the year. This year the band really showed its stuff by playing at most of the home basketball games.

Speaking of basketball, the team had quite a successful season that year with Lewis Heath as captain and Mr. Travis doing a grand job as coach.

In April of 1945, the nation was stunned by the death of President Roosevelt, who had recently been re-elected. A month later, the nation had cause to rejoice as the Allied armies swept across Germany, who soon unconditionally surrendered.

Soon June had rolled around, graduated another senior class, and elevated us from lowly freshmen to sophomores.

Elevated we were! As Sophomores in the fall of 1945, we looked down upon the rest of the student body from our lofty position on the second floor. During the summer the final guns of the war had ceased and celebrations full of rejoicing took place, the like of which we will never forget.

The idea for a sophomore "hall dance" was originated by certain members of the class during that year. It appears that the idea has taken root, for it has now become an annual affair. Of course, the dance was for the exclusive sophomores only.

Parents' Night was another feature of our second year. The students were shown

to the parents as they went through the motions of the daily grind. The parents enjoyed the whole affair, but it could not be called a typical school day, because most of the student body enjoyed it also!

During the year, Beverley Dalone, Barbara Ocain, and Rudolph Pipa were elected as our sophomore representatives on the Student Council.

The basketball team again had a successful season which was climaxed by the winning of the Housatonic Valley League championship. Not to be outdone, the baseball team also had a very successful season. They too won the league championship.

"Our Town," by Thornton Wilder, was the senior play of the year. Although this production was a little more dramatic than most senior productions, it was, nevertheless, greatly appreciated by those who attended it.

Upperclassmen! What a word.For that we had waited and worked for two long years. Well, at last it was here. In September of 1946 our class, now somewhat diminished in quantity, but not in quality, occupied Rooms 115 and 116. We came back, feeling more important and proud of our school, for during the summer "Look" magazine had taken some pictures of the school and pupils for an article entitled "The Hope of American Education."

During our third year two important school functions were inaugurated. The first was a six-man football team which had a very successful initial season by winning six out of nine games. The team was directed by Mr. Bedini, our new athletic coach. The second was the annual Carnival Ball, sponsored by the Student Council, and in which nearly all the school takes an active part. The theme of the first Carnival Ball was the New Orleans Mardi Gras.

The November elections of that year gave the nation its first all-Republican Congress since 1930. Meanwhile, the Student Council gained some new representatives from our class. They were Jane Watson, Violet Williams, and Karl Grannan.

We had an excellent Christmas assembly that year, which consisted of music by the glee club, talks on Christmas customs in foreign lands, and a Christmas story by Dr. Stcddard. Our own junior assembly was directed by Miss Harrington. The story was based upon the actions of some pretty queer students, which, of course, is nothing unusual. Nevertheless, the assembly was highly amusing and most of the jokes were quite good. A couple of them, however...

In May, we held our Junior Prom. The gym was decorated in the manner of a Southern garden and was very beautiful. John Leffingwell was elected chairman of the prom, with Miss DiGiacomo our adviser. Barbara Ocain made a very lovely queen as she was crowned surrounded by her six lovely attendants. The dance was both a social and financial success.

Our basketball team again added another fine season to its list by copping fifteen out of twenty games. The baseball team gave an excellent repeat performance by win-

ning all of its contests and again capturing the league championship. The track team stood up very well for the school by placing third in the state meet.

Now June was here once more and we had but one year to go. We entered our senior year realizing that this one was the most important of them all and the one that we shall always remember. After three years of work and enjoyment, we were all ready to enjoy the dignity and privileges of being seniors. Due to the reduced size of our class, we again occupied our old stamping grounds, rooms 115 and 116, while the large junior class moved into room 106.

Our final year commenced with a guest, although he did not remain too long. His name was Kilroy and though no one ever saw him, he had been everywhere. He might have had a water pistol, too. Everyone else did.

Psychology, the course we had expected, or at least, knew we were going to get, turned out to be a very interesting subject, even though most of us did not understand its language. Interesting, also, were the numerous jokes related to us by Dr. Stoddard.

This yar saw six new teachers enter the faculty, among them, Miss Meehan, now dean of girls, who had, before leaving for another position, taught civics to many of us as freshmen.

"Nothing But the Truth" was the title of our senior play. The fine job of acting by the members of the cast, the directing by Miss Allyn, and the work of the various committees all contributed to making this hilarious comedy a grand success. The class may also be proud of the way in which it handled the magazine sales this year. That project was another grand job well handled and well done.

The basketball team continued in its excellent standing by chalking up another fruitful season in which we won thirteen out of nineteen games. The football team, now in its second year, finished up by winning three out of nine contests.

The Student Council got its final two representatives from our class this year, namely, Audrey Murphy and John Leffingwell. The Council-sponsored Carnival Ball was again a popular success as it had been the year before. The theme of this year's ball was a circus train. The show put on by Regional students during the intermission was quite a hit with those attending the Ball.

Now, as the last days of our senior year come to an end, we wish to express our deepest thanks to our faculty for giving us the knowledge with which we leave and for their guidance on our many projects. We also thank our parents and townspeople for having given us one of the most excellent schools that a student could ask for. No matter what we may be doing or where we are in the years to come, we certainly shall not forget our four wonderful years at Regional.
