THE WHITE OAK FALLS

If, as estimated, it was 300 years old, then it was a seedling in 1704 when there were no organized towns in the Northwest Corner, and Connecticut was a British colony. It was 72 when the Declaration of Independence was proclaimed, and 83 when the national Constitution was written. By the time the Civil War broke out, it was 157, and the next-to-last time the Boston Red Sox won the



World Series (editor's note: heh, heh!) it was 214. When the Lorch farm was sold and the new high school opened in 1939, the great White Oak was 235 years old. But on July 5, 2004, a storm featuring strong winds and rain caused such severe damage that the mighty tree, symbol of Housatonic Valley Regional High School for 65 years, had to be removed. Since its inception, the school's yearbook has been called "The White Oak." The literary magazine has been called "The Acorn." Twice over the years school construction plans have been modified in response to outcries of protest: the great White Oak was not to be touched! Perhaps the legend that grew up about the tree sheltering young lovers exchanging their first kiss had something to do with the deep feelings for it. So the school grew and expanded around the tree. In its last years the White Oak was the centerpiece of the Senior Courtyard. By the end it had grown a 90-foot crown and was measured at 17 feet around the base of the trunk. Over time in recent decades it had received major TLC from Scott Monroe '70 and his tree company. Scott's feelings for that tree

and what it represented ran so deep that he never charged for his substantial services.

Bob Gambino, who retired from the Ag-Ed staff in 1998 (and later turned up as Mayor of New Milford!), actually grew seedlings from the White Oak in the greenhouse years ago. But all of those were given away.

Today an effort is underway to deal with the loss of the White Oak and to provide for beautiful plantings around the campus. The HVRHS Arboretum and Landscape Committee has been formed and seeks to become a committee of the Regional Board. Composed of various experts and individuals with special regard for the beauty of the grounds, they have begun to meet and to plan.

Already a few artifacts have been produced from small pieces of the great oak. Who knows what may turn up as a way to remember the tree that has meant so much to all of us. Meanwhile, the massive pieces of the old tree rest at the south end of the Ag-Ed section of the grounds, waiting for the choices to be made.

GOOD BYES

In recent months the Housatonic community has lost several former staff members and persons closely connected with the school. John W. Topping, Sr., of Falls Village and Palm Coast, FL, served on the custodial staff in the late sixties. Frank Samuelson, Sr., of Oxford, CT, served as superintendent of schools in Region One during the seventies. Hattie Travis of Fair Oaks, CA, teacher of physical education and wife of science teacher and coach Ambler Travis, was the last surviving member of the original faculty at the high school and author of the words to the school song. J. Henry "Hank" Belter '41 was a school board member and charter member of the HVRHS Athletic Hall of Fame. And long-time music teacher William J. "Bill" Meder passed away in May of 2004. Mr. Meder lived in the Amesville section of Salisbury from 1948 to 1990 where he raised his family and taught music both in the elementary schools of Region One and at HVRHS for 32 years. Vergne Harvey '56 wrote the following tribute to Mr. Meder:

"It started in third grade. Big excitement in Mrs. LeMoine's class. We were to meet our new music teacher. In walks Bill (Mr.) Meder. One of the first things he does is divide us according to our singing voices. Canaries, sparrows, warblers, crows. He later told me, 'Big mistake. Made a lot of parents angry. Had to stop it quick.' I had always wondered why I went from 'canary' to soprano so fast.

"This was a harbinger of things to come. I think Bill was one of the fairest men I ever knew and also very original in his approach to most things. Usually even-tempered, he was seen to blow his cool in frustration only a very few times. One time I remember the best was when I was waiting for him for a lesson after school. In sheer boredom I was banging on the music room piano at Salisbury Central School when he walked in. All of a sudden he was ten feet tall and gloweringly angry. I got a short lecture on how my parents had helped pay for that instrument, and

I was trying to bust it. That was it. Next thing I knew, we were into the lesson. Enough said.

"I think he trusted us kids more than we deserved, but he was a hard taskmaster when he thought he could bring out the best in a student. The other side of the coin was that he was quick to praise a good performance.

"He worked so hard with us to try to get us into All-State bands, orchestras and choruses. Those concerts and rehearsals were fun, and we wanted to go. He shepherded us through the All-New Englands in Claremont, New Hampshire.

"He made sure we enjoyed the whole music experience. I know I am not the only one for whom he is at the center of most good HVRHS memories.

"Bill would try anything. I can still remember the summer he built a complete covered deck on his house in Amesville. I can still see him on top of a 30-foot ladder painting and, instead of climbing down to move the ladder. he 'jacked' it along by picking it up with his feet while he hung onto the gutter. Scared his wife Gloria half to death. I am not sure if many people knew it, but he trained to be a fighter pilot near the end of World War II and in fact did well until he had to practice spins in what he called a 'Vultee Vibrator,' a notoriously difficult trainer. He washed out because he could not stay oriented. Well, the Army Air Force's loss was our gain for sure.

"Throughout his life he stayed involved with music. An excellent performer on several instruments, his forte was violin. Before and after he retired, he played in many municipal orchestras. As a teacher he got a whole raft of kids started on all kinds of instruments. Most of us got what amounted to private lessons to get us started.

"Along with all the music, he taught a lot of life lessons — mainly by example. His favorite motivating phrase, as many may recall, was, 'Use your noodle!' In other words, think things through.
