# Ed Kirby dies at 93



Ed Kirby

Ed Kirby left an indelible mark on the Northwest Corner. The 93-year-old educator, coach, author, geologist and historian died in February.

His passing was felt by all who knew him, but especially his Housatonic Valley Regional High School family. Kirby was devoted to the school and, at the time of his passing, was vice-

chairman of the HVRHS Alumni Association. To mark the life of this man who gave so much to the sports program and as an educational leader at the school, the association initiated aproject to name the baseball field in his honor. An initial ceremony was held in May to unveil the new scoreboard and fundraising efforts are currently continuing to upgrade the entire site.

Tributes poured in when the news of his death was revealed. Steve Blass, class of 1960, the major league baseball player who helped the Pittsburgh Pirates win a World Series in 1971, and has remained a local hero, said Kirby, his high school coach at Housatonic Valley Regional High School, was responsible for his career. "He was tough on me back then, and I didn't appreciate having to run up the hill from the fields as part of practice, but he cared so much."

Kirby and his wife, Mary, remained in close contact with Blass over the years and were often invited to attend important events for him. They were there two years ago for his retirement as a longtime Pirates announcer.

"He always had a great smile on his face," remembered Blass, who touched upon Kirby's books and other achievements. "At 93, what a life he had. It's time to celebrate that life."

Patricia A. Mechare, class of 1964, chairman of the association, came before the Region 1 Board of Education the night he died to request the ballfield be dedicated to Kirby. She said the group was planning this for a long time and it was unfortunate that he died

just before the honor was bestowed. "He was very deserving and this is long overdue," she said.

Barclay Prindle of Sharon, class of '56, called Kirby "my best friend," a friendship that began in the 1950s when Kirby served as his coach at Housatonic. He reminisced about the many trips they took out west and the extensive research and writings Kirby did on characters such as Butch Cassidy. Kirby, Prindle and the late Jack Mahoney relished their many western trips as part of the Wildcat Gorge Boozing and Wilderness Society, as well as their train trips home, which Kirby loved.

"I hope he meets up with Mahoney and they raise hell up there," Prindle joked.

Geology was a passion of Kirby's. He wrote several books on the subject and was a font of information about all the types of rocks in the area. He was president of the Friends of Beckley Furnace, a group devoted to the preservation of the site and educating the public about the iron ore industry that once thrived in the area.

Dick Paddock of Salisbury served with him on that committee and said, "The time I spent with him was one of the most enriching experiences in my life. He had so many positive effects on so many lives. I will miss him, but am very happy to have known him. He had so much knowledge and we had such fun."

Ellery "Woods" Sinclair of Falls Village, class of '56, was a colleague and dear friend of Kirby's. His proposal, approved by the Housatonic Valley FFA Alumni executive committee, was to make Kirby a member of the group in memoriam and that he be recognized on the alumni's life membership board with a plaque.

Kirby was born and raised in Sharon. He graduated from Housatonic in 1945 and entered the military, serving in Japan and Okinawa. Upon returning home, he attended what is now Central Connecticut State University and took his first teaching job at Cornwall Consolidated School, while coaching at Housatonic at the same time.

He then taught science at the high school, was named principal in 1966 and eventually assistant superintendent. He retired in 1985.

## **Kirby Field Update**

Naming the HVRHS baseball field in honor of Ed Kirby was always a goal of the HVRHS Alumni Association Board of Directors. This was achieved when the Region One Board of Education voted unanimously to name the field in his honor, and to make it the best baseball field in the Northwest Corner. With that recognition, the Alumni Association made the commitment to raise the funds necessary to make the ED KIRBY FIELD a real "field of dreams."

The fundraising committee of Steve Blass, '60, Maureen Kirby Dore, '76, Dick and Joanne Gustafson, '59 and '61, Julie Marshall Lang, '79, John McGuire,

'65, Champ Perotti, '83, Mickey and Tanya Riva, '61, Suzanne Hutchinson Ullram, '66 and Arthur Walters, '67 organized a personalized campaign for leadership gifts, followed by a general appeal to all HVRHS alumni and friends.

The ED KIRBY FIELD was dedicated in a special ceremony on May 21, 2021, with the entire Kirby family in attendance as the new electronic scoreboard was unveiled. Work now continues with improvements to the dugouts, installing new backstops and fencing, water fountains, field leveling with new clay and sod and the purchase of a Kromer Field mower/roller for use on all the school's athletic fields. ceremony is scheduled for spring 2022 when all the improvements will be in place.

# Two Students Receive Top FFA Award

For legions of students who have gone through Housatonic Valley Regional High School, the highlight of their four years was participation in the agricultural education program. How many times have we heard from graduates who've said their career paths were determined by courses taken in agricultural science and technology or that they didn't do well in school until they were motivated by taking part in those studies?

According to the literature put out by the department, the courses are open to all HVRHS students. They are designed to provide education, career training and experiences in the many areas of natural resources, agricultural engineering, biotechnology, animal science and plant science. The center consists of classrooms, a fully equipped food science lab, an agricultural mechanics shop, an animal barn, a small animal room, an aquaculture/hydroponics lab, a greenhouse and a forest woodlot laboratory. Students learn about the environment and the relationship among animals, plants, and machinery in our ever-changing productive society.

Students enrolled in agriculture classes are invited to join the HVRHS FFA Chapter. The National FFA organization changes students' lives through preparation for premier leadership, personal growth and career success. FFA promotes American values, citizenship and civic participation. The personal growth, leadership and career success skills that are developed through FFA serve a student well throughout life in a variety of vocational and avocational pathways.

While countless Housatonic alums have found success in the program, two were recently recognized for their outstanding contributions. Mari Cullerton, class of '17, and Lauren Murtagh, class of '18, were presented with the American FFA degree. Just one-half of one percent of FFA members around the country earn that



prestigious designation. They were among 20 selected from Connecticut.

Mari, who is from Canaan, was salutatorian of her class. As a triplet, she and her sisters ranked one, two and three in their class. She went on to major in environmental studies at UConn. She was a successful member of the Envirothon team. Her journey began in the summer of 2013 when she first met teacher (and now department chairman) David Moran, who encouraged her to try new things. She said her best decision was joining Envirothon. Mari is currently working with the USGS doing forestry demography work in Sequoia and Yosemite National parks.

"All those experiences at Housatonic helped me be a better person and who I am today," she said. "They helped me build the skills that I use every day."

Lauren's interest in the FFA program sprouted in her freshman life skills class and was spurred on by her family's landscaping business. She rose in the state FFA organization, serving as treasurer, vice-president and then president. She, too, was on the Envirothon team. She recalled when Moran signed her up for public speaking. "That changed my life and helped me be successful in FFA and life," she said. She has taken many trips as part of her state leadership role, including one to Africa. Lauren is currently a senior at UConn studying sustainable plant and soil systems with an environmental horticulture concentration and a turfgrass management minor. At college, she is president of Sigma Alpha, a professional women's agricultural society and a member of the collegiate timber team. "Post grad, I plan on returning home and joining our family company, New Images Landscaping in Sharon." she said.

David Moran spoke proudly of watching the two grow from shy students into women of achievement and leadership.
