## RESUME OF THE SEASON

The Housatonic Valley League was graced with the addition of two new members, the Thomaston and Terryville High Schools. These teams made their presence felt forcefully, as Terryville went on to win the championship, and Thomaston inflicted half of the defeats suffered by Regional this year. Two two-point defeats and one three-point defeat marred an otherwise excellent season.

Regional started with a rush winning their first six games with comparative ease. Ridgefield came to open the season and lost 44-31. Morris fell 60-35. For the third game the Blue and Gold was at a peak as they recorded a smashing victory over Gilbert High, 56-32. This was the first victory Regional ever won from Gilbert. Dover Plains, Washington, and Litchfield then fell by scores of $54-34,51-32$, and $56-43$ respectively.

After the Christmas Holidays Terryville stopped Regional's winning streak at six games by taking a hard-fought contest, 41-32 score. Regional then righted itself and went on another six-game rampage breaking school scoring records for team and individual play. Morris and Dover Plains were again easily defeated. Washington was thoroughly subdued by a 65-29 score, and Litchfield was trampled 73-32 when John O'Hara set a new individual scoring record of 33 points. Terryville was then upset as J. Dudley sparked the attack with sixteen points to lead the team to a 45-36 triumph. M. Clay performed superlatively on the defensive when he limited Lojeski to one field goal. Thomaston then stopped the surge by defeating Regional $35-32$ in a well-played contest.

The Housatonic Valley League tournament was then played with Regional beating Newtown 63-30 and Danbury Trade 43-31. Thomaston once again proved to be our bug-a-boo by taking the Blue and Gold's measure, 40-31.

The season ended on a dismal note, as a pair of two-point defeats were absorbed at the hands of Amenia (51-49), and Canton (54-52).

To recapitulate, Regional won 14 and lost 6 in a long and arduous campaign. O'Hara, Clay, Dudley, and R. Grannan all played good ball during the season. The "Shock Troops" gave creditable account of themselves when pressed into service. At the season's end J. Dudley was elected captain of the basketball team, replacing O'Hara and Clay.

## RESUME OF THE SEASON

The fall of 1946 saw a fall sport resumed at Regional. Six-man football was introduced, and it met with instantaneous enthusiasm. Overcoming the initial lack of a playing field, adequate equipment, and sufficient practice time, the Gold and Blue finished second in the league, winning the last four successive games.

The curtain-opener found Regional traveling to Washington where our team lost a hard-fought game by a score of 22 to 13. Milt Clay and John O'Hara scored the Regional touchdowns. Captain Pete Marcon performed superlatively both on the offensive and defensive.

At the next game Bethel was host to Regional, and we won 38 to 28 after a prodigious pep-rally. Paced by Milt Clay and Ross Grannan a $20-6$ lead was built up at half time. The second half was poorly played, but Regional held on long enough to emerge victorious.

For the season's third game Regional journeyed to New Milford and was defeated by the high school, 25-19. Poor pass defense at critical moments paved the way for three New Milford touchdowns. J. O'Hara and P. Marcon were outstanding for Regional.

Regional's next opponent was Ridgefield High School. The Millionaires were treated to a dazzling display of aerial wizardry, as Jack Dudley completed ten of eleven passes for a total gain of 242 yards. The final score was 50-19 in favor of Regional. P. Suzuki's effective blocking was a big factor in the victory. The outstanding play of the game was Clay's 75 -yard runback of the opening kick-off of the third period.

Regional absorbed its last defeat of the season at the hands of Hawley High School of Newtown by a score of 26-24. Hawley scored a last quarter touchdown to come from behind and defeat Regional.

For the next game Regional's field was ready. It was inaugurated with a richly deserved victory over Washington, $35-34$, as $M$. Hoshko threw a winning touchdown pass to Jack Dudley in the final moments of the game. Bethel, previously undefeated New Milford, and Newtown then fell to a vicious-tackling, hard-blocking Regional team by scores of 50-6, 38-8, and 44-0 respectively.

Regional scored 311 points to 167 for their opponents. P. Suzuki, Marcon, and O'Hara gave Regional the best line in the league. Clay's running, Dudley's passing, and Grannan's generalship made the Blue and Gold a threat when on the offensive.

## CLASSHISTORY

The Class of ' 47 entered this great school on the morning of September 8, 1943, well, most of us did, but at various times during our four-year stay we have welcomed other lucky members to our big happy family. Our first day was one of much excitement and anxiety. We rushed around the corridors trying to find rooms with such strange numbers as 115,106 , and 202 . Some of us even discovered that there were classrooms on the second floor, and this helped to solve many of our problems. Probably this is one of the few times in our lives that a map of a building would have been useful, but we were told that this happened to every entering freshman class-a natural occurrence. We struggled through the first few days and, needless to say, caught on very quickly-no thanks to the seniors and other upperclassmen!

Upon reviving from the shock and excitement of the first days we settled down to our laborious task of schoolwork and most of all-homework! We learned that six other towns were represented here by our fellow classmates, and we made many new acquaintancesmost of them being of the opposite sex. It was during these times that the general topic of discussion among buddies of different towns ran along the line that Canaan had more garages than Salisbury, or that Lakeville was larger than Cornwall. It was also during these times that we had those lovely dances and socials in order that we might become better acquainted with one another-so it was rumored. Before we all knew each other by name, a great deal of time had elapsed, and it was still some time before most of us or even the teachers could spell or pronounce such names as Knipmeyer correctly. Some of us never did learn.

In the fall, after succeeding in making new friends, we held elections to choose two persons to represent our freshman class in the Student Council. Dorothy Winn and Peter Marcon were elected. Most of the freshman boys were athletic-minded that year, and we had homeroom competition in basketball and softball besides our regular intramural sports. Some very interesting and exciting games developed from this series. The boys from Room 110 were champs, and it was no wonder, when you recall that Bleich, Clark, and Clay were only a few of the boys in that homeroom.

Two of our teachers were married that year. Miss Anderson and Miss Moore stepped into wedlock. That year also saw the arrival, in January, of Mr. Healy who came to teach algebra. This caused a great deal of excitement among the girls of the class and school, because Mr. Healy was young, handsome, and single!!

All in all ' 43 and ' 44 were a couple of happy and eventful years for most of us. Some of our brothers and sisters were away in the service. We tried to do our share by buying War Stamps and collecting scrap metal and paper. Remember those Mondays when we would all bring our extra savings to school to buy War Stamps, and how proud we were when we had bought all the stamps sent to our homeroom by the office? That summer we went home happy and carefree. Most of us could hardly wait to return, not so much that we missed homework, but we did miss our friends.

We began our sophomore year at Regional a bit uneasy and cocky, but we soon settled down. We had heard that the second year was always the hardest, and for many of us this was true. We worked hard and a large per cent of the sophomores were on the honor roll most of the year, especially Fuller and Knipmeyer.
'44 was election year, and with uncertain political and war news, things were kept buzzing. We heard talk of "not changing horses in the middle of the stream." And how can we ever forget the hot political speeches of Roosevelt and Dewey? Frequently we were allowed to express our own opinions about the fourth term, and it might be said that some of us did so most loudly. A special assembly was held in which some of our classmates gave political speeches, and in the following elections the Republicans swept the school, gaining a large majority in all homerooms; but it was somewhat different in the national spotlight.

The tea dances and other socials were continued, much to the dismay of some of the boys who would rather have played basketball. The basketball games were held that year with stiff competition arising among the homerooms on the second floor.

Miss Meehan and Mrs. Gulnac left us during the course of the year, and Miss DiGiacomo joined our staff of teachers.

On the brighter side we had school dances which began to interest us more and more. One of the big events of the year was the operetta. We left in June all looking forward to becoming juniors.

September, 1945, not only found us juniors, but also found one of the greatest wars in history had come to an end since we were together in June. At last we could be called upperclassmen, and most of us tried to have a little of that dignity which was a bit overdue.

This year we all took great pride in the basketball team. The fellows had a very successful season and captured the Housatonic Valley League trophy. Much credit is due Mr. Travis for turning out such a splendid team.

Monthly movies, both educational and diverting, were inaugurated.
We lost a good friend in Miss Magistro when she left the faculty in December. Then Miss Slavin surprised everyone by getting married. Most of us found it difficult to call her "Mrs. Lockhart" after knowing her for two and one-half years as "Miss Slavin."

Mr. Healy acted as adviser for the Junior Assembly where everyone found out that "It's a Grand Day for Singing." Nearly everybody turned out to see the senior play, "Our Town," and agreed that it was very well done.

May found us working on the big event of our junior year, the Junior Prom, with Miss DiGiacomo as adviser. Esther Williams was chosen prom queen with six very attracrive attendants. The prom is one which will be long remembered, for it was a huge success socially and financially.

The Regional baseball team was as successful as the basketball team and brought home another Housatonic Valley League trophy to add to our fast growing collection.

## NATIONAL HONOR SOCIETY

The National Honor Society exists throughout the entire nation and is sponsored by the National Association of Secondary School Principals. The society corresponds to Phi Beta Kappa in college and Cum Laude in private preparatory schools.

Students in secondary schools are elected to the National Honor Society by the faculty of their school. The elections are based upon three qualifications: scholarship, leadership, and character. Emphasis is placed upon the latter two, differing from Phi Beta Kappa and Cum Laude which base membership on scholarship alone.

## THE HISTORY OF THE FFA

Courses in vocational agriculture were first established in 1917. Within a few years, almost every state in the union had so-called "Agricultural Clubs," which were composed of boys taking vocational agriculture. These organizations were largely social and recreational in nature, but certain educational, improvement, and co-operative features were usually included as well.

As the number of organizations grew, the idea to organize the individual clubs into state organizations came into the mind of the leaders in the agricultural field.

Between 1923-1928 some states did actually form state organizations. In Virginia, the organization was called the "Future Farmers of America." This FFA was patterned after the FFV.

In November, 1928, the first national convention was held. Since that time, the FFA has steadily and rapidly expanded, extending to Hawaii and Puerto Rico. There are even similar organizations in foreign countries.

The national emblem of the FFA has a definite meaning. This emblem is used by members of all FFA organizations. It is composed of five symbols: the owl, which is symbolic of knowledge and wisdom; the plow, a symbol of labor and tillage of the soil; the rising sun, emblematic of progress and the new day that will dawn when all farmers are trained and have learned to co-operate; the cross section of an ear of corn represents common agricultural interests, because corn is native to America and is grown in every state; and the eagle, symbolic of the national scope of the organization.

The Housatonic Valley Chapter FFA is composed of about 30 members. The chapter meets twice a month for a business meeting. Officers are as follows: president, Edward Pedersen; vice-president, George Miner; secretary-treasurer, Stanley Griswold; adviser, Mr. Clarke Wood; reporter, Raymond Hart.

A budget and a program of work was drawn up. The latter envisioned about 90 goals, of which the most important are as follows: to have projects; to purchase goods cooperatively; to do dairy herd improvement work for farmers; to enter the Vo-Ag day contests at Storrs; to raise a cash crop; to have a father and son banquet; to make a scrapbook of all activities; to have a basketball team; to admit honorary members; to maintain fire crews, and to help farmers when they need extra labor.

These are only a few of the major goals which the FFA carries out. The FFA members of this school always try to do their best, regardless of the work which faces them or the problems they have to solve. The members hope that this tradition will be carried on.
