



The first Regional High School in Connecticut was built on the beautiful 125 acre site on the Housatonic River near Lime Rock in Falls Village. The central portion of the building is faced with native stone in tones of warm gray and tan. The one-story sections are of sand-struck brick, whitewashed. The porticos have tower and trim of wood and are painted white. The building is typical of the best architecture of early Connecticut. The construction and the facilities will be in accordance with the most progressive modern practice for educational buildings.

BOYS' SOCCER

For the varsity soccer squad of 1978, the season was one of growth, new experience with stronger competition, and successful year as well.

The varsity squad ended the 1978 season with a 7-8-0 record, missing a tournament bid by just one game, a 3-0 defeat to Northwest Regional. Although their final record did not live up to the expectations of many, it also reflected the type of competition which filled the 15 game schedule. This schedule included many teams of the Berkshire League, the league the team will compete in from now on. Although the highly competitive soccer of the Berkshire League may cost Housatonic a state tournament bid, it was important to play teams of the Berkshire League in order to prepare for seasons to come. As head coach David Shaffer pointed out, HVRHS has been able to compete with perennial powerhouses in the area, and that six of Housatonic's nine 1978 opponents made the playoffs.

As for the 1978 wrap-up, co-captain Brad Paulsen led the team with twelve goals, and senior Bob Sieller followed with nine. Several underclassmen also contributed to the scoring, including Danny Rodrigo with four, Stephen Kroehle with three, and Kevin Brady with one. The team scored 39 goals for the season, while the goal-tending of senior Joe Cleaveland and sophomore Tim Brown yielded 35 goals for an average of 2.6 goals against per game.


The varsity season of 1979 could be one of continued growth, since Housatonic is losing linemen Brad Paulsen, Bob Seiller, midfielders John LaPorta, Farid Abdeliziz, Jeff Shores, fullbacks Kurt Sternlof, Chris Dodge, co-captain Larry Madsen, and goalkeeper Joe Cleaveland. With the tremendous amount of participation in this year's program, there should be plenty of junior varsity players ready to fill the shoes of the departing seniors.

The junior varsity team enjoyed one of the most successful seasons ever, ending the season with a record of 8-6-1, under first year coach Fred DiMenna. The JV's were led by Rick Sieller with 9 goals, and Mike Lomask and Doug McCall each had 3. The team allowed just 22 goals, while scoring 27 during the season.

The boy's third team finished with a record of 4-6-1, under the first year coaching of John Lamb. The team was led by Clark Eddy, who scored 9 goals for the year.

GIRLS' SOCCER

The girls varsity soccer team ended the 1978 season with a 10-3-2 record, which enabled them to advance to the first round of the state tournament. The Mountaineers were matched up against R.H.A.M. high school on November 7. Housatonic jumped out to an early 1-0 lead on Kim Miles' first goal of the day, and went on to beat R.H.A.M. 3-2 with one more from Miles and one from senior Renee Conklin.

On November 9, Housatonic faced #1 ranked E.O. Smith High School in the second round of the tourney. The season ended with a 5-1 loss to Smith, with Kim Miles scoring the only goal for HVRMS.


As for the season wrap-up of 1978, the varsity squad scored 50 goals, for an average of 3.33 goals per game. The goaltending yielded just 18 goals, for an average of just 1.20. Junior Kim Miles led the team in scoring with 16 goals, Terry Carberry followed with 11, and senior Renee Conklin had 7.

The captains of the team were seniors Sue Chilcoat, Betsy Schafer and Marybeth Alto. Chilcoat captured the MVP award for the season.

The junior varsity squad ended the 1978 season with an 8-4 record. The squad was led by Barbie Baird, who set a JV record by scoring 18 goals in just 12 games. The Mountaineers scored 42 goals while giving up just 23. Freshman Candi Carlson and sophomore Patti Mulligan each set a JV record for the most assists for a single season, with 4 each. With a very successful varsity and JV program, Coach Greco is looking forward to a good year in 1979.



CROSS COUNTRY

The 1978 cross country team, better known as the Pack, had one of their best seasons ever, and one of the best records of all fall sports in 1978, ending the regular season with a total of 13 wins, and 4 losses.

The team earned second place in the Northwest Conference, as they look forward to competition in the Berkshire League in 1979. The Pack ranked 12th against all Class S schools in Connecticut.

Housatonic had seven medal winners overall in various contests and tourneys throughout the season. In the first meet of '78, the Wolcott Invitational, sophomore Dave Heacox won the junior varsity race, capturing the first award of the season.

Another highlight of the campaign was the Northwest Conference Individual Championship, where the team placed 4th of 12 teams with a total of 90 points. Senior Frank Ghi and sophomore Wendy Pitcher were named All-Stars, while Heacox, Bob Anderson and Jeff Brum were sighted with honorable mention awards.

Later in the season, the team competed in the Small School State Sectional Race, where they placed 4th of 17 teams, allowing the team to compete in the Class S State Championship.

Head Coach David Lindsay said that he will miss the seniors, tri-captains Ghi, Brum and Glen Cross, MVP Anderson, Brad Perkins and Debbie Bohren, since there were not juniors on the '78 squad.

FIELD HOCKEY


The varsity field hockey had a difficult yet rewarding season in 1978. The squad, led by tri-captains Bonnie Sheldon, Maura Landis, and Darlene Hewins, struggled to a 3-8-5 record.

The year started out as a good one, with a 5-0 victory over Mount Everett, and an impressive 2-1 clipping of Wamogo, a new Berkshire League opponent for '79. The goaltending of senior Kathy Hanes kept the girls in many close games, as she recorded three shutouts during the campaign. The stellar defensive play of junior Maria Koneazny also kept the Mountaineers in many close ones. Head Coach Denise Volack has a lot to look forward to in the '79 season, with Koneazny returning along with offensive power Denise McDonald, who scored 11 of the team's 18 goals this season. That total led the team in scoring.

Other highlights of the season included a scoreless tie with conference leader Farmington, and two ties with a tough Canton squad.



FOOTBALL

The 1978 season was one of the most successful seasons in Housatonic's history. Coach Michael Guy called the season a tremendous one, especially for seniors Chuck Arrigoni, Mike Dodge, Richard Hogan, Bob Hoshko, Russell Juds, Kevin McGivern, Bill O'Connor, Joe Pierzga, Duke Pozzetta and Dan Stewart. The Mountaineer's overall record for 1978 was 6-1-1, the best win-lost record in 25 years.

Highlights of the season include a dynamic offense led by co-captain Mike Dodge and the tenacious work of Kevin McGivern. The offense was also sparked by the super running of John Ongley and Bob Pequignot.

A devastating defense, anchored by cocaptain Duke Pozetta, was backed up by Arrigoni, Pierzga and Stewart. The team also displayed an enthusiastic effort on special teams, with seniors Mike Bonn, Rich Hogan and Bob Hoshko leading the way. Russell Juds, exchange student from South Africa, did a great job with the kicking duty.

The team enthusiasm which they helped establish as freshmen carried through their four years of football. This enthusiasm is responsible for the accomplishments they can be proud of as seniors.







Throughout the year, FBLA kept the school informed of happenings by putting up bulletin boards, and setting up displays.








The members of the council and their advisor Mr. Bayersdorfer enable the student body to be fully represented in school affairs. This year's council is proud of their achievements.



Their first loss came to an undefeated Torrington High School squad. They lost 46-41 in overtime, as the game was forced into the extra period by an HVRHS foul. The team had trouble with one team, that being Litchfield. They lost both home and away games to the Cowboys.

The biggest highlight of the year was the state tournament victory against Farmington. The team worked together to gain the first tournament victory in the history of HVRHS girls basketball.

The season ended as Housatonic came up against the best. The team faced Immaculate in the quarter finals of the state tourney. With a 20-1 season record, Immaculate had little trouble defeating Housy 52-25.

The squad will be losing three seniors this year, co-captain Marybeth Alto, cocaptain Susan Chilcoat, and most improved player Amy Fracaro.

The junior varsity had a great season, as they had a stellar record of 17-1. The squad had romping victories over Wamogo and Terryville, 65-10 and 45-19.


































BASKETBALL

The 1978-79 basketball season was one of growth, since the varsity team was primarily made up of underclassmen. Junior Gib Lassen led the team in scoring, averaging 25.4 points per game (a new school record), and in rebounding too. Lassen poured in 560 points for the season, which is also a new school record.

The team was led by captain Bob Sieller, who broke the single season assist record with 191. As the point guard, he provided leadership on the court. After missing several games with an injury, he returned to spark the Mountaineer attack, as the team struggled in its first year in the Berkshire League. Although the team played below 500 percent, they entered the state tournament, with a ranking of 23rd in class S.

Other members of the squad will be missed. Seniors Mike Dodge and Niel Miller battled taller players under the boards all season, with Miller clearly being the most improved player of the Housatonic basketball program.

In tournament action, the Mountaineers battled Wamogo in the first round, as Housatonic won 62-57. It was the second consecutive season in which the Mountaineers reached the second round of the tourney.

The season ended with an 88-81 loss to the highly regarded Litchfield Cowboys in the second round. The game featured a battle between sharp shooters, as the top two scorers in the Berkshire League poured in 68 points between them. Lassen had 33 for HVRHS while Vigeant had 35.

The team ended the season with a 11-12 record, and was ranked fifth in the region.

The junior varsity had another successful season as they ended the campaign with a 10-8 record. Sophomore Tib Miller was the leading scorer for the season with 274 points, for an average of 15.2 points a game. Scott Palmer added 180 points to the season's efforts.



In the third meet of the campaign, the grapplers trailed Somers 27-0 midway through the match. Again, the team battled back to win, with a 31-30 score in their favor.



With a strong nucleus of wrestlers returning for the 1980 season, the team looks forward to another successful season.





The seniors who graduated from one of the strongest track teams in the school's history are: Jeff Brum, Kurt Sternlof, Larry Keller, Ken Lee, Glen Cross, Shawn McCracken, Frank Ghi, Russell Juds, and captain Brad Paulsen.

The team placed second overall in the Berkshire League Relays, tenth place in the Class S state championship, first place in the Berkshire League Decathlon with Paulsen scoring 5499 points, and had three athletes compete in the CIAC Olympic Meet, as Paulsen, Ghi and Mulligan all competed.

Mike Mulligan and Bob Pequignot were elected captains for the 1980 season, which should be another good one.

Donna Pequignot broke her own school record she set in 1978 when she was a freshman. She also competed in the states, finishing third in the high jump.



The girl's softball team had a good season, despite missing the state tournament by just one game in the standings.

The junior varsity also had a great year, with a 15-2 record. Coach Dower, who will return for his second year as coach, said that the team's future looks very promising.





A disappointing season for the varsity baseball team ended on an exciting note on the last day of the season, when it took 12 innings before Berkshire League Champion Shepaug could push across the winning runs in a 9-2 contest.

Sophomore Tib Miller, pitching the first eight innings, struck out 13 batters and allowed only three hits and no earned runs in a gutsy performance.

Eddie Ustico and Steve Donahue collected singles apiece as Housatonic out-hit Shepaug, undefeated in the Berkshire League, 9-6. Lapses in base running and on defense caused Housatonic's eventual downfall.

Highlights of the season were: the pitching of Miller; the relief pitching, between injuries of senior Guy Bunce; the hitting of Tom Van de Bogart; and the power hitting of Mike Gawel, who hit three home runs, two of them in one game.

Despite the final record of six wins and 11 losses (five of which were of the one-run variety), prospects appear to be bright for the future of the baseball program at HVRHS. Coach John Lamb, the junior varsity coach, led the team to seven victories against six defeats. They did this despite losing their best pitcher to the varsity team.

And the freshman team, under firstyear coach Fred DiMenna, won eight games and lost only two.

With only three seniors in the group the possibility exists of repeating this season's great performance next year.




This Spring the Faculty Association produced their fourth musical for the benefit of the student scholarship fund.

This year's production, labeled a "musical fable of Broadway" was based on a story and characters created by Damon Runyon with music by Jo Swerling and Abe Burrows.









Mr. Norman Pattberg

In 1956 Mr. Pattberg began teaching at H.V.R.H.S. Twenty-three years, 3500 students, 6 superintendents, 2 principals, 20 different subjects, 15 department colleagues, and 1 wife later, he is retiring.

Before coming to Housatonic Mr. Pattberg ran his own decorating business in New Haven. When that was interrupted by World War Two, he joined the Army Air Corps and flew missions with the 99th Bombardment Squadron stationed on Tinian. He flew several missions on B-29's as a flight engineer. After returning to the states in 1945 he resumed his decorating business, but teaching beckoned him.

He attended Quinnipiac College for a degree in Business Administration and then the University of Bridgeport for a master's degree in secondary education, "because he wanted to teach."

Mr. Pattberg began teaching in 1952 at Milford Prep. Four years later, with a one year interlude teaching at Shelter Island in New York State, he began teaching in Falls Village. He met his wife, Mary, while teaching at H.V.R.H.S. and after their marriage in 1959 they moved to Falls Village where they have lived since 1961.

Retiring after teaching two generations of Northwest Corner children, perhaps one of his former students best sums up the reason for his success. "You know, Mr. Pattberg really likes kids."




