



We, the Senior Class of 1945, wish to express our deepest thanks and sincerest gratitude to Mr. Frank B. Richardson for what he has done for us. His tact, generous nature, and genial disposition have made him a devoted friend both to students and faculty.

CLASS HISTORY

The fall of 1941-42 was eventful for many reasons. September will long remain in our memories, for we were entering the door of our four years of education to prepare ourselves for civil or military life. Not more than four months went by before our country became directly a part of another great war. We, in school, in order to help, did many things, such as buying war stamps and bonds, and having a paper salvage drive.

When we walked through the doors of HVRHS for the first time, we found ourselves wandering about, hopelessly guessing and, of course, making mistakes. We eventually assembled in our home room after consuming some time in finding it. Courage was indeed needed by all of us to try to overcome the "kidding" by the upper classmen. They took great pleasure in directing us on forlorn journeys to some fictitious room on the *third* floor.

That year soccer was introduced as a new sport, and the Student Council was organized with Ronald Wike and Dorothy Drescher as the freshmen representatives. It was also the year of that sneak attack on Pearl Harbor, for which the Nips are paying so dearly now. Rationing began with sugar and tires, but gasoline was still plentiful, thank goodness. *That* year, we were the underdogs.

In 1943 we entered our sophomore year with that ambitious air and superiority that only sophomores possess. That year, we could torment the incoming Freshmen. But on the whole, I guess, we were rather lenient toward them.

Drastic cuts in the petrol supply eliminated the Junior Prom, disappointing many of us. The NORTHWEST CORNER was established, with Angelina Marcon as editor. Jane Jackson and Chester Raynard were voted Student Council members, along with the two elected in the freshman year. "Tangerine" and "Sleepy Lagoon" were popular with the girls. The boys did not dance much as they were interested mostly in sports and being inducted into the Armed Forces. The Moron Club was organized by the junior girls, Janet Vaill being the president. But it is no longer in existence. We wonder why. Oh well, morons will be morons!

Room 103, which contained some of the present seniors, had been an outstanding room the year round. One of its achievements was the purchase of a Service Flag for the school under the guidance of Mr. Smith.

The first of our troops landed in Ireland, being convoyed through the submarine infested waters of the Atlantic. We gained the "indispensable support" of Italy. That year must have been a poor one for us. "Mairzy Doats" and "Pistol Packin' Mama" seemed to have the popular support.

Juniors! Whee! Some of us began to think seriously of school and of graduation. But alas! they were few and considerably outnumbered. 1944 was the year of our Junior Prom, which, may I add, was a great success, both finan-

cially and socially. The girls showed up in some of the latest styles of wartime dresses. I think some of the boys are still wondering "*what* holds those gowns up." In the dim light you could just catch the gleam from the medals of many of the servicemen present. Frank Coons and June Williams were elected to be added to our growing Student Council representation. The Council came more into notice with Jack Marcon as president. An Honor Roll of all servicemen from this school was started by the Civics Club. Basketball was good, with Bob Gaylord as captain, but the team struck some tough opposition.

1944-45 arrived, our senior year! This was the final chapter in the history of the Class of "45. We were the upper classmen now, just bubbling over with superiority and dignity. For the first and last time, we were under one roof, and president. Though we were the largest freshmen class, there were only seventeen boys graduating.

The Northwest Corner was continued this year, under the editorship of John Pacocha. The Board decided to publish the paper here in order to have more prompt and efficient news service. This meant an increased amount of work for the adviser, and especially the publishing staff, under the direction of Miss Gesell.

The Student Council became even more active under Ronald Wike, with the New Year's Dance, the Emblems, and at last, our School Band.

We had some of the best assemblies of our four years during the last year. The school as a whole rocked with the music of the Coast Guard Band. The majority of the students polled Republican in the school elections. The national election results were different — Roosevelt was elected, you remember.

In late November, Miss Meehan left us. Her classes wondered who would be their new teacher. It worked out all right after awhile, but I am sure she is missed by the students and faculty. We express thanks to her for her splendid cooperation and help in the Student Council.

The invasion of France had been finally accomplished and the Allied Armies pushed to the Siegfried Line. Then last December, "when the war was almost won," the Belgian Bulge . . .

Varsity basketball was a success this year. Lewis Heath's fine ball handling and shooting, along with the efficient support of the rest of the team, led the Regional Five close to the League championship. Coach Travis deserves a great deal of credit for the hard work he put into the team. We hope the team next year will go much further.

This ends the history of the Class of 1945, at least so far as school is concerned. We shall try to use this experience in the world, starting now.

Peggy — Here's my rocket ship, now. Why, there's Peter Turkiewicz, our ambassador to Russia. And he was such a quiet boy in school!




