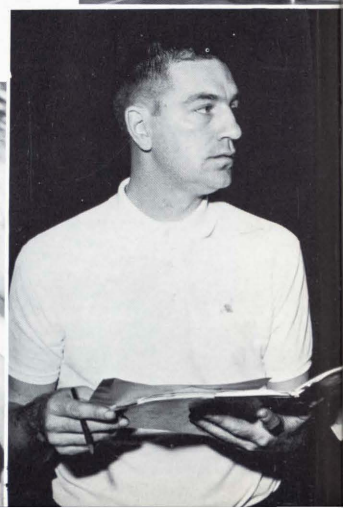
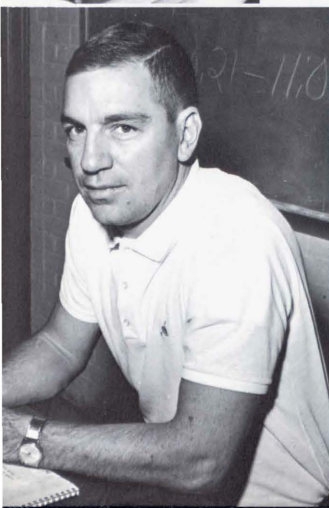




The Class of 1968 takes pride in dedicating

REFLECTIONS: The Class of 1968

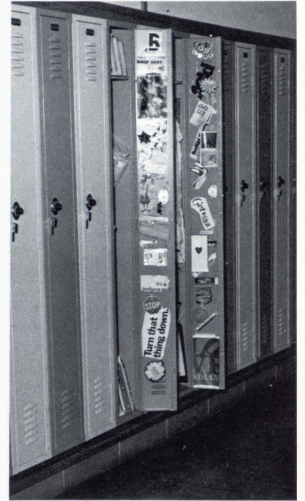
As we look back on our years at Regional, we recall the day when we entered the doors for the first time. It was a year to make new friends and adjust to our new school life.

As Sophomores, we remember our lonely year on the second floor. That was a year of hard work and determination.

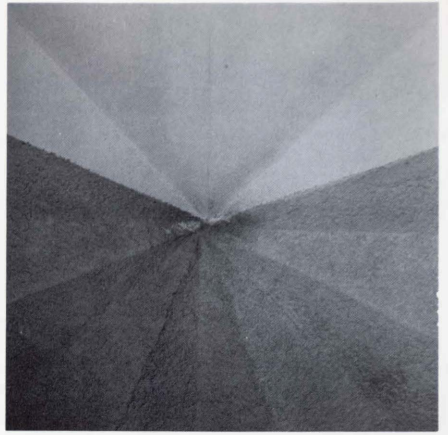
As Juniors, we became Upper Classmen. That year was high-lighted by our Junior Prom, and the work we did for the School-to-School project.

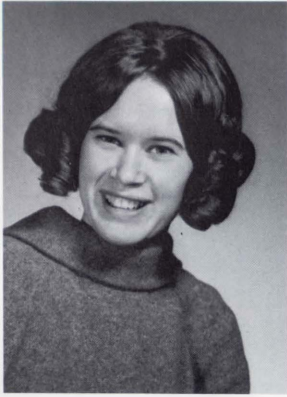
In the Senior Magazine Drive, we proved to everyone that a small, dedicated class could accomplish as much as larger classes had done in the past.

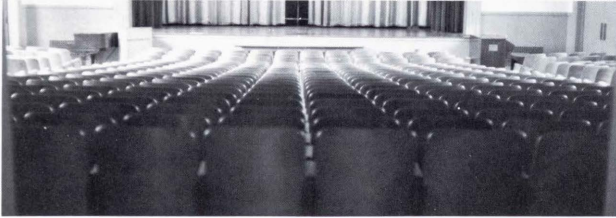
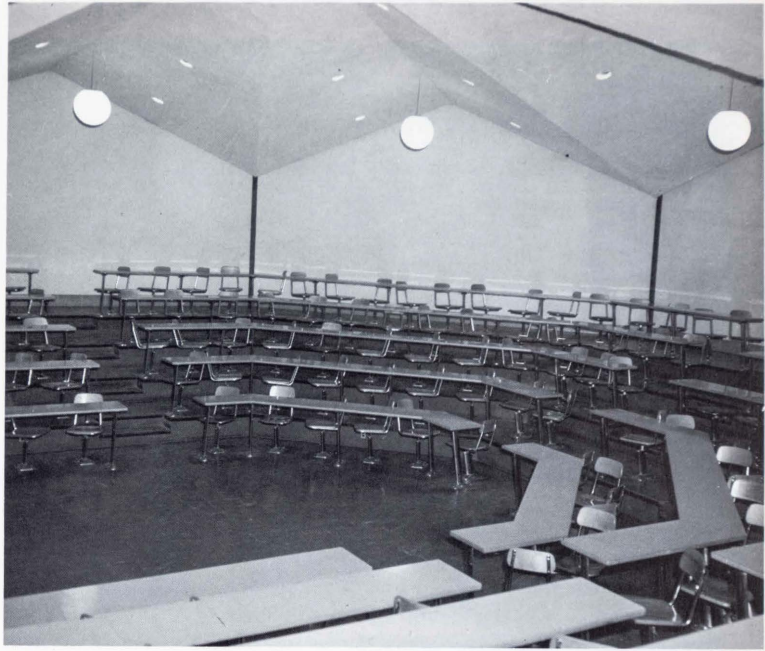


Introduction

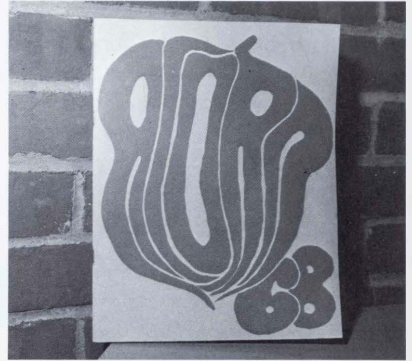

The Acorn is our newest literary venture. It is a showcase for literary and art talent of both faculty and students, and has gained a large following in its short existence.

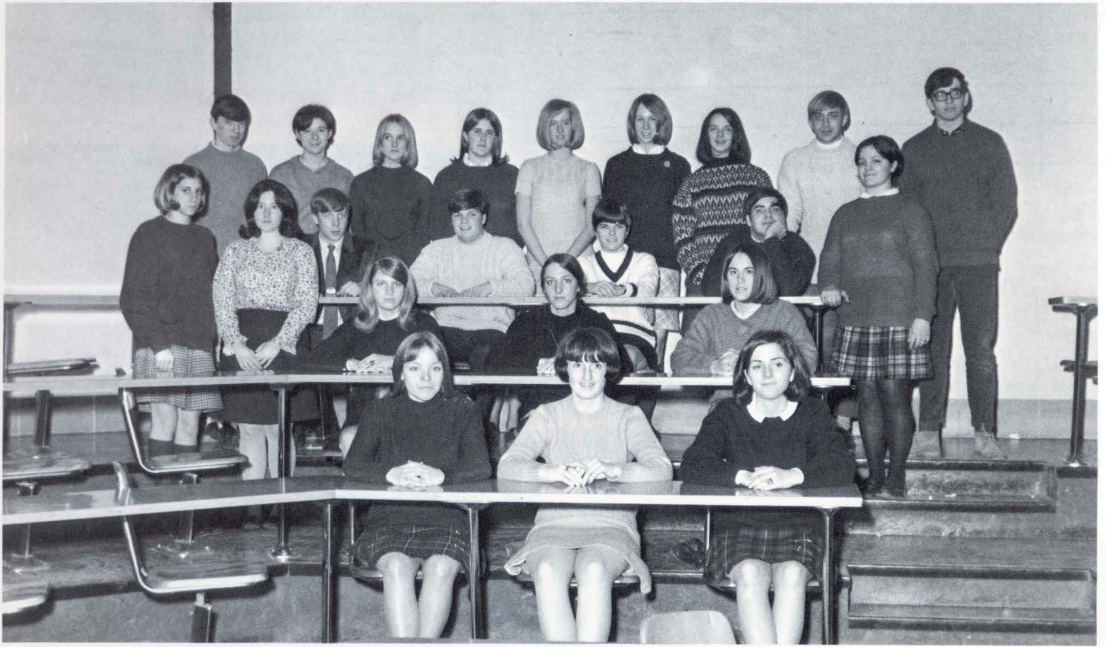
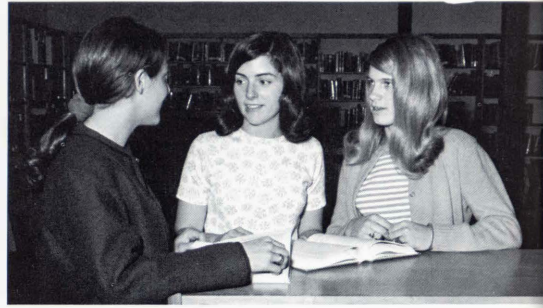
The hard work and long hours of the second year of publication resulted in a larger magazine and increased sales. The effort involved was easily noticeable in the quality presented in the finished product.

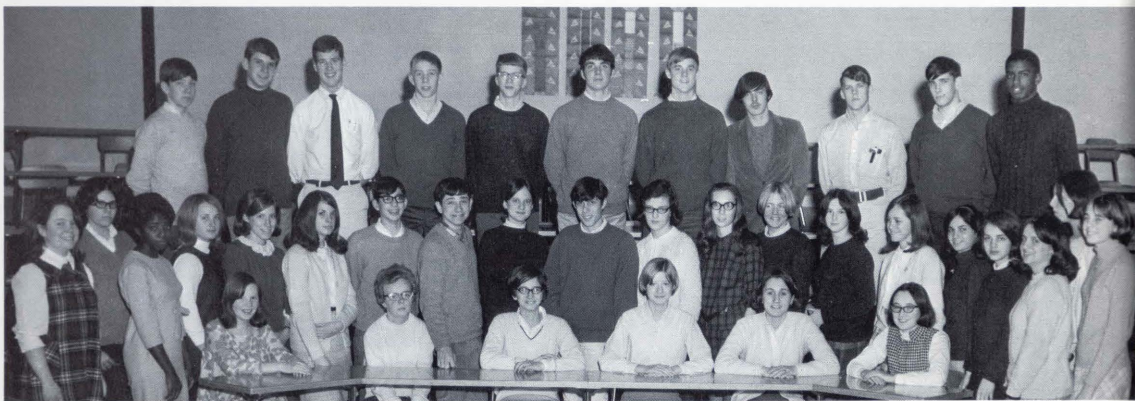

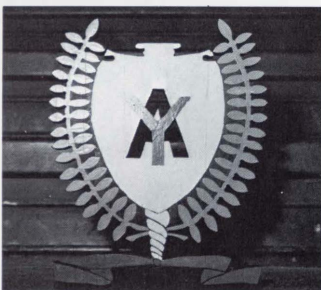

Candystripers

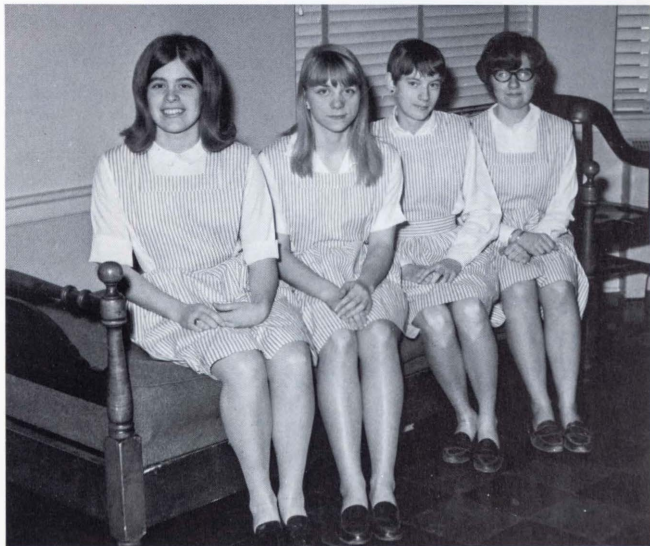

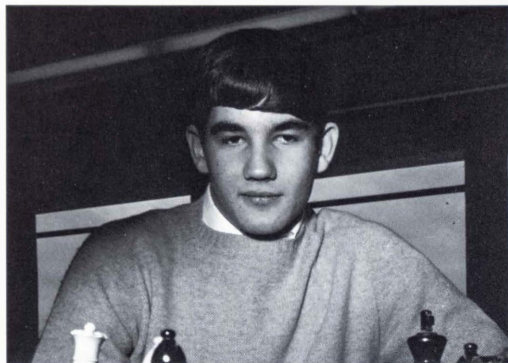

game. Due to a series of complications the annual Varsity Varieties was unable to be produced this year.

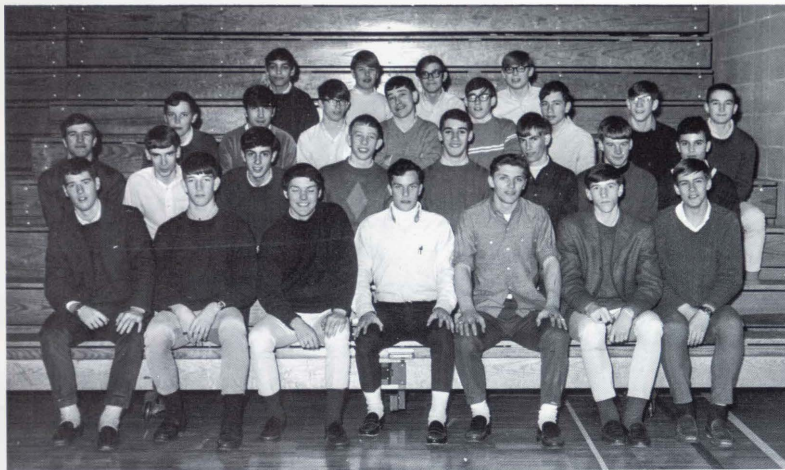

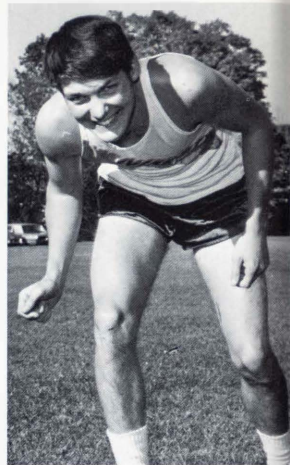
Cross Country Team Is Second In Conference

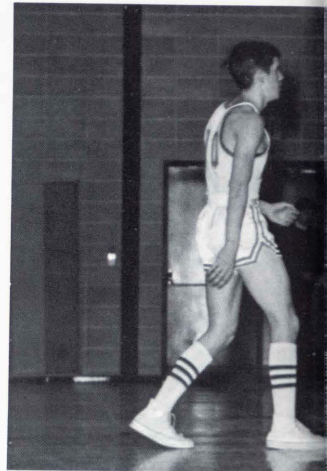
The team developed into a hard running, never-say-die machine that bounced back from a first loss, and turned out five wins in a row before re-

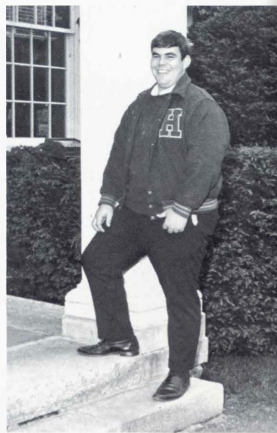
Track

These boys are only a sampling of the talent there is at Regional which is coming out through sports. The track team will continue in the years to come with bigger and better teams.



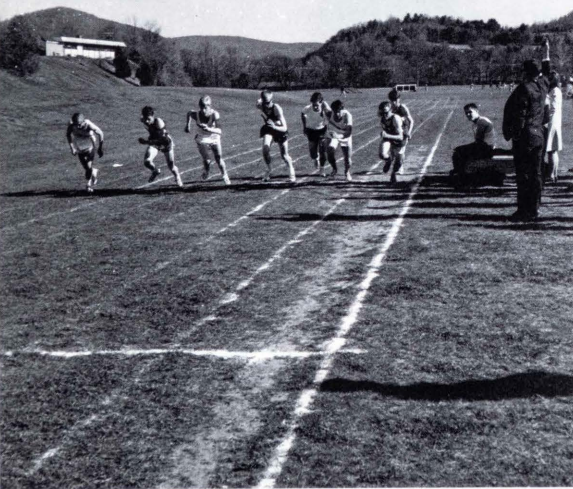
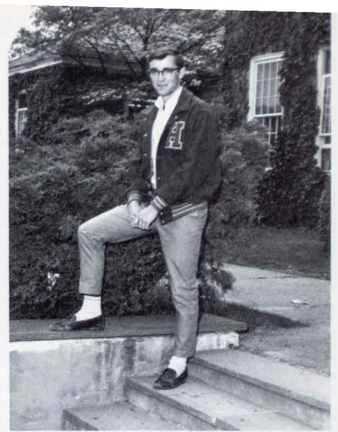
